THE EDITOR'S MAIL.

Mr. Watson Replies to Father Burke.

Srs.—In a letter in your issue of to-day, Father Burke says: "a letter appeared in your columns from the facile pen of my friend Mr. Watson, in which he, without qualification or reserve placed at the door of the Baughlan or Ragwort (Senecio Jacobaea) the strange cattle disease of Pictou County and, also the Hay Fever, "I would respectfully suggest to my friend Father Burke to follow his own advice, "Let us go slow in these matters and be sure of our ground", for in the letter in question I neither mentioned nor referred to the Pictou county cattle disease, neither did I state, that the Senecio is the cause of Hay Fever.

True I have elsewhere suggested as a possible or even the probable cause of the cattle disease a fungus which I found growing upon the Senecio, which fungus has been stated by the American Bureau of Agriculture to cause death among cattle but that is a very different thing from charging the Ragwort with the deed, as the same mold grows upon oats. It is therefore foreign to the present issue to discuss Prof. Fletcher's and Dr. Pethick's views upon the matter as Father Bourke gives their opinions as to the Senecio itself being the cause of the trouble, which I never affirmed.

As to hay fever. Prof. Fletcher in the letter quoted by my Reverend friend is evidently of the same opinion as is so universally held that the disease is aggravated by the presence of certain plants of the order Compositae, but neither he nor I "positively" connects the plant in question "with diseases with which it may have nothing to do at all."

In conclusion, it remains a fact that this opinion is widely held, and with very good justification, and I think I was quite right in suggesting a crusade against the plants upon suspicion. It seems to me far better to send a warning and do all we can to have the suspected weeds exterminated rather than to remain silent because a summer hotel keeper loses the money which two visitors might have paid him.—Lawrence W. Watson.
