Describes Visit To Harmony Settlement

(Island Traveller in Halifax Herald)

As you motor along the paved highway west of Summerside for a distance of some fifteen miles, you pass through the village of Richmond, then about two miles further on you will notice an arrow on which is printed the name Harmony, pointing to a dirt road on the left. Turn in and drive a short distance and you will be in Harmony. The settlement must be fully three miles in length, and the families, who number around twenty, are practically all engaged in farming.

On the day of my visit most of the inhabitants were in the fields harvesting the potatoes. I met and talked with many of these farmers and their families, and a good number of their surnames were Yeo. There was Percy Yeo, Clayton Yeo, Johnnie Yeo, William Yeo and Keir Yeo. Then away in off the road lived Herb Yeo, and at another home I met Russell Yeo who had just come up to date one at that, is operated by the Yeo family, who number around twenty, are practically all engaged in farming.

Other well known residents I saw were: James Diamond, Lester McKinnon, Russell MacWilliams, Clayton Wilson, Frank Deighan and George Ramsay.

During the course of my wanderings I saw the mail driver, Arnold MacEntee, from Richmond, busily delivering the mail to all the box holders on this road. The one store in the village, and an open market on the main highway, operated by Paul Perry. Paul and I had a brief chat while I was purchasing some smokes and lighting up. Then I meandered down the road to where some men were engaged in carrying out extensive repairs to the highway. I found Edwin Yeo in charge together with Fred Ford, Rod McKinnon, Bruce Ramsay and Gordon Murray. And with that I made my departure from Harmony after a visit which was very much in keeping with it's name.

When the meeting opened at ten minutes to eight a large number of ex-servicemen as well as some other citizens were present in the Council Chamber. The clerk read all the correspondence from the beginning and when he commenced to read a letter objecting to the permit being granted, the matter was left over till last evening.

The communication from the Legion was signed by Roland Philippon, president and W. A. Arnett Secretary.

Councillor Morrison then moved that the permit be granted. At this point Mayor Arnett said he wanted to be fair and although none of those present had asked permission to speak he would give them an opportunity to do so if they desired. Mr. Roland Philippon then spoke on behalf of the Legion. He said first of all the notice in the paper had specified a date before which objections would be received and only two had come forward. With reference to the rest of the letters he expressed the opinion that they were not voluntary. He said they had information that a person or persons had gone around canvassing the district after the date had expired. Mr. Philippon said that the other operator of a meat market on that site who had been referred to in the letters, had not had water or sewage and the proposed market would have these. This zoning law was put in operation, he continued, while these men were away fighting, before

they returned hundreds of applications for new businesses had been put through. The Legion claims that it is not fair to discriminate against them. They fought that those who remained at home could retain their property. In conclusion he said he did not think a good spirit was being shown by the citizens or the Council.

Mr. Cecil Carver then asked and was granted permission to speak as a private citizen. He stated that he was now operating a store in the same building as a meat market and would take an affidavit that he is not bothered by either rats or flies.

Councillor Mollison stated that in looking over the letters he found that they were all typed on the same kind of paper. Someone did a good job of organization and just as almost anybody will sign a petition of any kind in the same way almost anybody will sign a letter that is presented to them all typed out. On the other hand the applicant had not canvassed but left it to the Council. Another thing he pointed out, was that all the objections were under the sanitary by-law and not under the building by-law. Councillor Mollison outlined the applicant's six years of service and said he had risked his life hundreds of times for the rest of us. In war lots of promises are made to these men but in peace time they are forgotten. He said he would not be proud of himself if he turned this man down. He then moved that the application be granted with certain restrictions and could be cancelled if he did not operate properly. The resolution to the contrary moved previously had not been seconded.

Councillor Wedge, seconding Councillor Mollison's motion, said that he has had charge of the police force for the last ten years and that this is the first time he has ever had a complaint about that market having been unsanitary. If it was so dirty as now claimed he thought it strange that he had not been called as he is called about everything else. He also said that there is a tenant market opposite his home and it does not attract either rats or flies.

Intimating that he could vote against the resolution the Mayor said no one has done more for the returned men than he has, this matter is not one of doing anything against the returned men it is a matter of the building by-law. If the citizens are not in favor of the law he would be the first one to oppose it. He then went on to describe the benefits of the law and that most people had obeyed it. He said you cannot refuse some and give permits to others. As Mayor his duty is to carry out the law. Councillor Wedge suggested that it would not be violating the law as there is a special section in the law which allows permits to be granted in special cases. The motion was then put and defeated.—S.
