

By-Law Compelling The Removal Of Snow And Ice From Off The Sidewalks.

Attention of householders is called to the following extract from the City by-laws. "It shall be the duty of every tenant or occupier of any premises in the City, or in case there be no tenant, then of the owner of such premises to keep such portion of any public walk as shall be immediately in front of such premises free from snow at all times except that it shall be sufficient to have the same free from snow four hours after the ceasing of any snow storm, if such ceases in the daytime, or if in the night time (i.e. before ten o'clock in the day time following; and further to keep such portion of public walk free from ice at all reasonable times, otherwise to cover the same with sand, ashes or other materials sufficient to give safe footing."

WINNIPEG, Dec. 17—(CP)—Featured only by a large export business, trading on Winnipeg grain exchange today was dull and wheat futures prices closed unchanged to 1-8 cent below the previous figures. December futures finished at 74 cents a bushel, May 77 3-4 and July 78 7-8. Trading was poor with United States interests accounting for most of it and some Canadian mill buying for the flour trade also reported. Some spreading in coarse grains was reported with holders switching holdings of December to those of May in oats and barley. Some shipper interest came in for barley. MONTREAL, Dec. 17—(CP)—There were 82 cattle, 124 sheep and lambs, 314 pigs, and 186 calves for sale on Montreal markets today. Prices on all classes of livestock were steady to firm. Cattle were unchanged at \$4.50 to \$5.50 for butcher cows. Canners and cutters \$3.25 to \$4.25. Common bulls \$4.50 to \$6. Veal calves \$9.50 to \$13.50. Drinkers \$7 to \$9 and grassers were \$6 to \$8.25. Good ewes and wethers were \$11.50. When graded heavy lambs were cut \$1 per hundredweight, and light lambs were cut \$1 to \$2 per hundredweight. Sheep were from \$4 to \$6.50. Hogs were firm at \$15.25 for B-1 dressed, \$11.25 for B-1 alive fed and watered, and \$11.50 off trucks delivered. Grade A drew \$1 25c hog premium with counts on off grades. Sows were \$8 to \$9 live weight. Rail grade hogs \$14.65, contract deliveries \$14.85, rail grade sows number one up to 170 pounds \$17.75, number one over 270 pounds \$9.75, number two undesirable all weights \$8.75. Choice steers \$9.75, good \$9, medium \$8, fair \$6.25, common \$5.25. Choice heifers \$8.50, good \$8, medium \$7, fair \$5.75, common \$4.50 down. Good cows \$6.75, medium \$5.75, fair \$5. Canners \$3.75 down, cutters \$4.25 down. Boning bulls \$5.25 down, butcher bulls \$6.50. Grassers \$5.25 down. No quotation on veal and lambs.

NEW YORK, Dec. 17—(AP)—The stock market today bowed under the weight of selling which was partly for establishment of tax losses and partly a protective operation by holders worried over the war situation. Many active Canadian stocks were fractions lower. Walkers common declined 7-8, preferred 5-8; International Nickel 5-8; Ford "A," Dome Mines 1-4; Distillers Seagram 5-8; Hollinger, Imperial Oil, Lake Shore Mines, Canadian Pacific 1-8. Unchanged were Bell Telephone and McIntyre Mines. The Associated Press 60-stock index had a net decline of 6 of a point at 364, lowest level for the index since April 7, 1938. Transactions totalled 1,223,500 shares. Stocks making new bottoms for the year or longer included American Telephone, which came back a bit after a 5-point drop; General Motors, Chrysler, U.S. Rubber, Montgomery Ward, Sears Roebuck and American Can. Among other losers were Douglas Aircraft, Glenn Martin, American Airlines, Westinghouse, Du Pont, Union Carbide, Chesapeake and Ohio, Southern Railway and Texas Co.

2. Apart from war needs industrial and civil requirements in steel will be difficult and almost impossible to produce unless the necessary scrap is brought into market.
3. In Canadian plants, such as yours, is an excess of 500,000 tons of scrap lying unused or being retained for some contemplated need which never arises. FROM CANADA'S STANDPOINT IT IS FALSE ECONOMY TO SACRIFICE 100 TONS OF VITAL RAW MATERIALS FOR THE SAKE OF ONE TON OF RECLAIMED OR SPARE PARTS.
4. WE NEED EVERY POUND OF YOUR SCRAP MATERIALS; check all obsolescent machinery, broken equipment and worn out tools. Arrange to have this material centralized in your plant and make immediate disposition. If you lack the organization or necessary labour to wreck or dismantle, contact your closest dealer or write this department for information, but in any event act immediately.
5. We stress this vital point. Today, it is not the value of the material in dollars and cents that should motivate the movement of your scrap; PRICES ON SCRAP ARE FIXED AT ALL POINTS IN CANADA BUT UNFORTUNATELY FEW PEOPLE UNDERSTAND THAT THESE PRICES ARE FOR SCRAP SORTED, PREPARED AND DELIVERED TO THE STEEL MILL, AND THAT WHEN TRANSPORTATION AND PREPARATION COSTS ARE DEDUCTED, THE VALUE OF THE SCRAP MAY BE ANYWHERE FROM \$3.00 TO \$8.00 LESS THAN THE FIXED PRICE. WHETHER YOU SECURE \$5.00 OR \$10.00 PER TON OR WHETHER YOU DONATE YOUR SCRAP TO THE SALVAGE ORGANIZATIONS IT REMAINS YOUR SERIOUS OBLIGATION TO SPEED THE FLOW OF THIS MATERIAL INTO WAR INDUSTRY PRODUCTION.
6. Many industries in Canada have equipment and steel structures located on their property and under their control, withheld from the scrap market however, because of logical depreciation reasons. This department is vitally interested in the possibility of bringing this material to market immediately and should you have or know of any industry which might have any such equipment, structures or plants, report this information to the Director of Salvage, Ottawa: This survey is essential, since without this knowledge no sound method of immediate depreciation can be advocated or adopted.

A message of vital importance to Canadian Industry and Canada itself, will be delivered by Mr. F. B. Kilbourn, the Steel Controller, on the 18th of December, 1941, at 8:30 p. m. E.D.S.T. on the C. B. C. network; your attention is particularly requested.

MONTREAL, Dec. 17—(CP)—Issues on an average moved down slightly today on the stock exchange as eastern war news had an unsettling effect locally and in New York. An attempted rally in mid-afternoon petered out though it left some leaders in higher ground. Lower among industrials were Steel of Canada preferred, Canadian Car, Dominion Bridge, Dominion Coal preferred, Doeco "B" and National Steel Car. Asbestos was a late firmer. St. Lawrence Paper preferred lost a couple of points in newspapers. Mines dropping were Consolidated Smelters, Hollinger, Hudson Bay Mining and International Nickel, Noranda lost an early lift. Imperial was easier in oils. Montreal Power and Shawinigan figured in the rally but were the only utilities higher. Quebec Power, Gagneaux and Canada Northern Power being casualties. C.P.R. and Canada Steamship finished behind in carriers. Price changes were irregular in miscellaneous, Dominion Textile and Bruck improving and Celanese and Imperial Tobacco backing up. Total sales: 12,900 shares; Industrials, 8,200; Mines, 4,700.
