LEGISLATURE PROROGUED

His Honor the Lieutenant Governor Assents to all the Measures.

THE LAST MOMENTS OF THE SESSION

Spent in Telling Stories—The Speech From the Throne—A Number of Ladies Occupy Seats on the Floor of the House.

MORNING SESSION. Friday, May 10th.

House met at 10.30. Hon. Commissioner of Public Works answered a number of questions asked during the session.

Upon motion of Captain Read the bill to amend the Incorporation of the Dunk River Cheese Factory was given its third reading and passed.

Upon motion of Mr. McLeod a bill to alter the time for holding the October term of the Supreme Court of Judicature in Prince County was read a third time and passed.

Upon motion of Hon. Mr. McNeill the House resolved itself into a committee of the whole with Mr. McWilliams in the chair to take into consideration the schedules of pauper grants of the Province. The scale was reported agreed without amendments.

On motion of the Commissioner of Public Works sundry account and vouchers also overseers' and supervisors' returns were ordered to be returned to the officers where they belonged.

House went into committee with Captain Read in the chair to consider a Bill to amend an Act for the appointment of stipendiary magistrates for the different counties in the province of Prince Edward Island. By this Act the qualification of five years standing for barristers to be appointed to that position will be reduced to three.

Bill reported agreed to without amendment.

The bill to ratify the agreement between the Governments of Canada and P. E. Island re subsidy was given its third reading and passed.

A Committee of Messrs. Hughes, Palmer and Caot. Read was appointed to submit an address to His Honor thanking him for the communication sent during the session.
