**CENTRAL GUARDIAN**  
 Explains workings of Unemployment Insurance

Letters of enquiry indicate that Regional Officials of the Unemployment Insurance Commission are encountering a good deal of misunderstanding among workers and employers in regard to the proper functions of the workers' insurance books and stamps in an effort to clear up these difficulties, locally at least, Mr. William M. Kesson, Inspector of Insurance Revenue, Charlottetown, gave the following statement to the "Guardian":

The insurance books and stamps provide a simple, inexpensive means of keeping records of contributions made to the insurance fund by both employers and workers. They are supplied to employers by the Unemployment Insurance Commission and the stamps may be purchased from the Post Offices by employers holding necessary permits.
