AWARDED DAMAGES — Earl Brown, Charlottetown was awarded \$1275 damages in Supreme Court yesterday. Total damages suffered in a motor accident in 1938 had been \$1700 a civil jury headed by Neil Dr. rach found. The jury found the defendant, the Irving Oil Company responsible for only 75 per cent of the damages under a statute passed in 1937. The plaintiff was responsible for 25 per cent of the damages through "contributory negligence" the jury found. The case arose out of a collision between a car driven by Brown and an Irving Oil Company truck. Brown and passengers in his car were injured. Mr. Justice A. E. Arsenault presided at the hearing.
