

Lower P. E. I. Potato Acreage Estimated For Present Year

According to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics' "Intentions to plant" report, Prince Edward Island potato growers will seed approximately 32,700 acres this year, as compared with an area of 33,400 acres in 1936.

The indicated acreage in Canada for the current season is but a few hundred acres more than last year, with plantings for the present season possibly covering 501,000 acres as compared with 496,000 acres last year.

Indications are that all provinces with the exception of the Maritimes, the chief potato belt of Canada, and Saskatchewan, will have increased plantings, with the province of Ontario increasing its acreage by about 4,400 acres.

The report cautions that the acreage estimated for 1937 should not be expected to compare exactly with the actual plantings, but is merely indicative of farmers' plantings about May 1.

Other provinces with their intended plantings for the present season, showing a comparison with last year (in brackets) follow:
Nova Scotia, 20,400 (20,600); New Brunswick, 44,600 (45,100); Quebec, 132,800 (131,200); Ontario, 149,400 (145,000); Manitoba, 32,200 (31,600); Saskatchewan, 42,400 (44,200); Alberta, 28,600 (27,800); British Columbia, 17,500 (17,900); and Canada as a whole 501,000 (496,000).

in the west with the new Government-owned all-metal plane similar to that used by Merrill on his trans-Atlantic flight. It is estimated 10 pilots will be sufficient to inaugurate the service and no difficulty will be encountered in recruiting them among Canadians.
Before regular flights with passengers are attempted the course will be flown repeatedly to train the pilots to line-flying with beam guidance and to permit them to study the route. Several Canadians who have been for some time flying scheduled routes in the United States will be brought back to help inaugurate the new service. Delivery of the necessary machines will be possible in ample time for the needs of the Corporation, according to arrangements existing between the provisional directors and the manufacturing company in California. Probably six machines will be delivered this year.

Junior Red Cross Handicapped Children's Work

Last year the Junior Red Cross in Canada spent \$40,198.00 in providing treatment for 2,303 physically handicapped Canadian boys and girls.
From the beginning of the peace time programme to the end of the last school year 13,795 handicapped children, exclusive of dental cases, have been treated in Canada through the Junior Red Cross.
Prince Edward Island rates high in this phase of the Junior Red Cross endeavour for the Island Juniors, with the assistance of the Rotary and Gyro Clubs, have provided treatment during the past year for 369 physically handicapped children.


