FOX STEALING CASE IS NOW BEING HEARD

Preliminary Trial of Mallett and Binns Now Before Chief Magistrate Shaw - Case Adjourned Until Wednesday.

The preliminary hearing in the recent fox stealing case came up before Chief Magistrate Shaw yesterday. This is a charge against Emmanuel Mallett and Lewis Binns for stealing foxes out of the ranch of James L. Sims at French River. This is not the same charge for which Frank Mallett was charged and acquitted at Summerside last week. The latter was charged with having in his possession stolen foxes, knowing them to be stolen.

The evidence at the Summerside case showed that he had possession of the foxes, but his defense was that he did not know they were stolen and on this case he was acquitted. He had not been to French River to the Sims' ranch at all as the evidence showed.

The case before Magistrate Shaw yesterday is a charge of actually stealing the foxes from the Sims ranch. The reason why one trial was in Summerside and the other here is that the Sims ranch is located in Queen's County, while Ram's Island where the foxes were discovered, is in Prince County.

Mr. J. O. Campbell appeared for the Crown and Mr. J. J. Johnston, K. C., for Mallett.

Mr. Campbell at this stage suggested that the prisoners be tried separately, Mr. Johnston objected, stating that all the evidence already taken had been taken against the prisoners jointly.

His Honour noted the objection proceeded in the case against Mallett.
