

CATTLE ARE STARVING.

DENVER, Col., December 25.—Thousands of cattle are reported to be starving on the range in Northwestern Colorado. The humane society has appealed to the owners to rescue their stock, and they have replied that they are powerless to do so.

What Could Hanna Tell?

Walter Wellman, a well known United States Journalist, in an article in Collier's Weekly, says:—"The operators gave-out some statements to the New York newspapers in which they declared the Civic Federation had done more harm than good in the strike, and intimating that Mr. Hanna would do better not to mix politics with labor questions. Hanna was indignant. He called up George W. Perkins. Perkins told Hanna not to mind what the railroad Presidents were saying—to let it pass, 'But I do mind, and I won't let it pass,' replied Hanna. 'Perkins, I want to serve notice on these men, through you, that if I ever see another line like that in the papers coming from them I will go to New York, call a meeting of labor people at Cooper Union, and I'll give the full history of this coal strike. You know what that means? Mr. Perkins passed the word on the Presidents, and they have not uttered a word in criticism of Hanna or the Civic Federation since.'"

Wellman wrote this just before the strike was settled, and while Hanna himself was striving to bring about an understanding. It has not been lost sight of, however, and several newspapers across the line are suggesting that much might be forgiven if Mr. Hanna told the whole story anyway. Some of them regret that the operators did not adopt towards him that lofty air of patronizing condescension which invariably characterized their dealings with Mr. Mitchell. In which case there is little doubt that Mr. Hanna would not have displayed the same skillful, shrewd, and in the end triumphant, tactics of the strike leader. His methods might in the end have been more ponderous, and rough—very rough. The operators are to be blamed for not giving Hanna an opportunity to tell all he knows, and he knows a lot evidently.

Carried Unanimously.

A small town in Scotland, eager to vie with its neighbors in the coronation ceremonies, held a public meeting of its citizens in the town hall. The provost, a democratic old blacksmith, was elected chairman, and after explaining the purpose for which the meeting was called, asked for suggestions as to the best manner of celebrating the event.

A prominent citizen rose from his seat in the middle of the hall, and said:—"Maister Cheerman and Gentlemen—I'm nae speaker, but on sic an occasion as this I wid like tae make the suggestion that the toon should celebrate the coronation by holdin' one itself on a sma' scale. I propose that the cheerman, oor worthy provost, be king for the occasion, an', if he's willin', we'll crown him in the square wi' a new silk hat, for I'm thinkin' the one he wears is oot o' fashion and the worse o' the wear."

Loud cheers greeted this proposal, and it was carried unanimously.

LONDON, December 25.—The very Rev. Wm. R. W. Stephens, Dean of Winchester, died yesterday from typhoid fever. It is supposed that he contracted the disease at a mayoral banquet at Southampton, on November 10, from eating oysters that were contaminated with sewage. Several of the guests who attended the banquet are ill, and two others have already died.
