Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

This is the head of a family of any male over eighteen years old may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entries by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required in apt where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

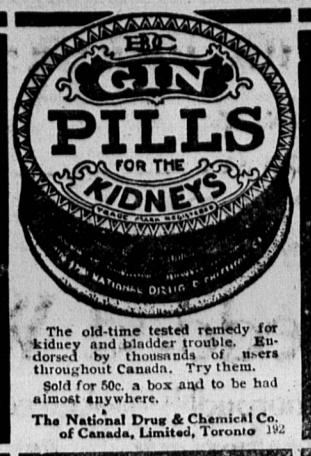
A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years, cultivate six acres and erect a house worth \$500.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of drought, scarcity of stock and. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

MONROE DOCTRINE PLACED IN TRUE LIGHT

London, March 20—The Liverpool Post says:

"Lord Robert Cecil places the Monroe Doctrine, in its true light with regard to the League of Nations. He says in effect that so far from the League being the death blow to the capital article of American political faith it is the application of that article on a universal scale.

"According to the draft of the covenant, the parties to the league undertake to respect and preserve as against external aggression the territorial integrity and existing political independence on the part of every member of the League. The most absolute supporter of Monroeism could surely desire no more than that.

"The independence of both Americas is guaranteed by an overwhelming majority of the powers, great and small. The League of Nations will give America her rightful place in the van of the forces of civilization and henceforth are to shape the large purposes of our race."

STEAMER WRECKED SOUTHEAST OF GRAND MANAN

EASTPORT, Maine, March 21—The British steamer Troja, which grounded on Old Proprietor ledge, southwest of Grand Manan, N.B., yesterday, was abandoned late today. The crew of 28 men were taken off early in the day by the Wood Island life saving crew and Captain John Caine left the ship several hours later.

The Troja, registering 1,853 tons, was bound from Louisburg, N.S. for St John with 3,650 tons of coal. She struck the ledge yesterday forenoon, when running through a dense fog with a heavy southwest wind. The life savers reported that the steamer was full of water, and would be a total loss.

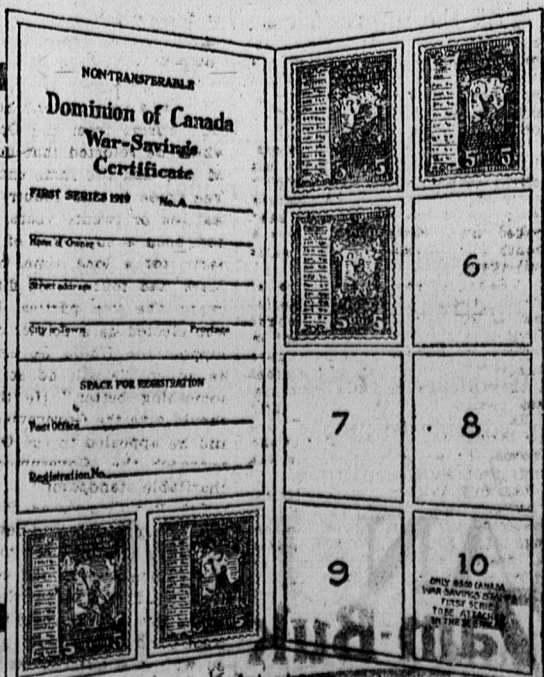
