Survey Shows Remarkable Progress

(Canadian Press)
OTTAWA, Nov. 9.—The opening up of Canada's natural resources during recent years is reflected in record industrial progress in practically all fields of endeavor according to data revealed in a Dominion-wide survey conducted by the Department of the Interior.
"Remarkable progress in the development of the country's agricultural, forest, mineral, water power and other resources show that Canada instead of confining her energies to a few extractive industries is making a broad-fronted advance in many fields of activity," the report states.
Ranking second to agriculture in value of products is placed the forest industry of the Dominion which since 1926 has become the world's greatest newsprint producer. For the first eight months of 1928, an increase of 15 percent in newsprint production was revealed compared with the corresponding period of last year. In a similar ratio the lumbering industry has developed steadily.

EFFECT OF SUNLIGHT ON DAIRY PRODUCTS

Dr. E. G. Hood, Chief of the Division of Dairy Research, of the Federal Department of Agriculture, states that it is a well established scientific fact that direct sunlight has a detrimental effect on the flavour of practically all dairy products and especially on milk, cream and butter.
This statement was given by Dr. Hood when questioned regarding the practice of housewives using window-sills as refrigerators during the autumn season when they have stopped taking ice. From the standpoint of keeping the products cool, the window-sill answers the purpose, but if the window is located where direct sunlight can reach it, dairy products should never be kept there.
Milk, cream and butter when exposed to direct sunlight quickly develop abnormal flavours which are generally of a metallic or tallowy nature. This tallowy flavour is caused by the action of sunlight on butterfat and has been known to develop to a very noticeable degree after an exposure of an hour or so. In the case of butter, the fat turns to a very light or white colour, and the same change takes place in the fat in milk whether it is homogenized or not.
Dr. Hood states that if consumers find that milk or cream has become tallowy in flavour after keeping in for twenty four hours, they should not blame the dairy by whom they are supplied, if these dairy products have been kept in a window exposed to the sun. This flavour can be prevented if milk and cream is produced from direct sunlight, by wrapping the bottles in a piece of heavy brown paper or by placing them in a wooden box made for the purpose, when it is necessary to keep them outside.
