place on it. The ring is open to each hand, the banderillo calls to the bull, which charges at once. The banderillo runs to meet him, and as the bull lowers his head to toss him, leans over and plants the sword in the bull's shoulder and around it runs a solid wooden fence, about five feet high, with a skill, and the crowd cheers. There are three banderillos, and they plant six darts, which hang down on either side of the bull.

After the bull has again been coaxed into charging the elusive "capeadores" with their capes, and he needs very little coaxing it is time for the matador to appear for the third stage of the fight, "the killing." The bull by now is a sorry spectacle, covered with foam and blood, which runs down his shoulders and sides; his mouth open as he labors for breath, and with six fiery barb hanging from his neck. He is unable, on account of his injuries, to carry his head high, but he appears to be as full of fight as ever.

The matador approaches, carrying a small cape thrown over his slender sword, which is slightly curved and about three feet long. This is the climax of the fight, and the moment the crowd loves best. The matador proceeds to show his skill by taking various risky chances. He may approach the bull, and lay his hat or his hand on the bull's head. The raging animal gives a desperate lunge, but encounters only the cape, the man has stepped aside. Or he may even kneel on the ground before the bull, wave his cape on one side of him, and stay there immovable while the bull charges madly at it, his horns only inches from the tormentor. As the bull turns after charging to see what has become of his adversary the matador does not rise from his knees; he merely swings the cape over to his other side and again the bull charges by. After a display of nerve like this the crowd goes wild. Hats, gloves, sombreros and money are thrown into the ring on all sides and the roars of approval are deafening.

The trumpets blow their warning that the allotted time is nearly up, and the matador proceeds to end the affair. He turns to the President and solemnly dedicates the bull to him, or perhaps to some lady admirer, then throws off his hat and approaches the bull again. He extends his left arm holding his cape, and with his right hand appears to carefully aim at the proper spot he wishes to strike. The bull charges again, and just as his head is lowered to toss the matador the sword is driven home, and the matador steps aside, all in the fraction of a second. If the aim has been true the bull stands a moment, or else walks in a circle, then quietly lies down.
