Tony Manero Surprises His Critics

NEW YORK, Jan. 6—(AP)—A rare man is Tony Manero. Success didn't just settle in the ratters of his skull, inflating his head like wind in a toy balloon. It went to Tony's brain and heart, hitting him high among the brightest stars of United States golf. When Tony whooped and blazed down the home stretch of Baltusrol last summer to beat Lighthorse Harry Cooper out of the prized National Open Golf Championship, a group of better known but beaten pros groaned. "Manero, Manero," they mumbled. "He won't be much better than poor Sam Parks as open champ."

"Why, that guy hasn't even a sound golf swing," spouted another. Such a statement is partially true because Tony with his awkward stance is hardly a man of rhythm. It was in June that Tony, distinguished principally up to that time by a flowing mustachio, began his climb to fame. And now he's been fooling his critics since. While Sam Parks won about \$500 in prize money during his tenure as United States open champion, Manero won \$3,929.22 for the year, much of it after June. In the United States professional championship at Pinehurst, Tony showed the pros he could take it and hand it out. He took the terrific needling from his "pals" and rolled right along to the quarter-finals with the steadiest game in the field. The few pros who didn't think Tony had the heart found it out at Pinehurst.

Three Games Scheduled In N.H.L. Tonight

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Jan. 6—Montreal Canadiens, riding high on top of the Canadian section of the National Hockey League, will be seeking their first win of the season over Toronto Maple Leafs tomorrow when the teams meet here. Leafs and Canucks have met twice this year and both times the Toronto club has come out on top. The French club's four point lead over second by Maroons will not be threatened by the result of the game as Tommy Gorman's men are idle until the end of the week. Detroit Red Wings visit New York Americans tomorrow with a chance of pulling out alone in first place in the American Section. At present they are tied with New York Rangers, who, like Maroons are idle until Saturday. A win for Americans and loss for Toronto would send the New York club on point ahead of Leafs. The Gotham game will see Red Dutton send in a flock of rookies from New Haven to replace his ailing regulars, while Lorne Chabot will be in goal in place of Roy Worters, injured seriously in the Rangers game Tuesday. Boston travel to Chicago for the only other game scheduled. The result will have no bearing on the standing but Bruins need a win to keep pace with Detroit and Rangers.

200 Golfers In Hunt For Rich Prize

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 6—(AP)—Two hundred players on scattered fronts today sought to qualify for the \$8,000 Los Angeles open tournament, richest event of California's winter golf campaign. A trimmed field of 128 will go in to the 72-hole battle Friday, with a cheque for \$2,500 awaiting the winner in the final 18 holes Monday. Twenty-nine top notch performers, including ex-champions of the event, were exempt from today's qualifying round. The field included Horton Smith, Harry Cooper, Ralph Guldahl, Olin Dutra, Johnny Revolta, MacDonal Smith, Jimmy Thomson, Leo Diegel, Paul Runyan and Lawson Little.

Australia Prepares For Empire Games In 1938; Program Of Events Announced

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) BURLINGTON, Ont., Jan. 6—Secretary Bobby Robinson of the British Empire Games Association of Canada said today he had been notified that Australia was prepared to contribute up to \$30,000 towards expenses of athletes competing in the 1938 games in Sydney, N. S. W. Canada would receive \$6,000 assistance provided at least 15 athletes were sent. The Australian Games Committee also will house and feed the visiting teams for two weeks prior to the games, during the one-week competition and a week after the games. Officials, not to exceed 10 per cent of the competitive strength, will be similarly entertained. Mr. Robinson, organizer of the first Empire Games in Hamilton in 1930, said the games were being financed by the State Government of New South Wales. They will open Feb. 5 and continue until Feb. 12. One of the chief problems facing the Canadian Committee is when to conduct trials. They would have to be held late this year if they are staged in the east. Vancouver could hold them, however, in January, 1938. Bowling and sculling, dropped from the program of events at the London Games in 1934, will be an important part of the Sydney Games. Events are carded for eight-oared crews, four-oared crews and singles scullers. Men's Swimming—110-yard free style, 440-yard free style, 1650-yard free style, 110-yard backstroke, 220-yard backstroke, tower diving, springboard diving, 880-yard relay, 330-yard medley relay (110 yards each free style, backstroke and breaststroke). Women's Swimming—110-yard free style, 440-yard free style, 110-yard backstroke, 220-yard breaststroke, tower diving, springboard diving, 440-yard relay, 330-yard medley relay (100 yard each free style, backstroke and breaststroke). Cycling—1000-metre time trial, 1000-metre scratch sprint, 10-mile track race, 100-kilometre road race. Boxing—All classes from flyweight to heavyweight. Wrestling—All classes from bantamweight to heavyweight. Lawn Bowling—Singles, doubles, rinks (fours).

Dutton And Patrick In Verbal Battle

NEW YORK, Jan. 7—(CP)—Manhattan's hockey fans waged heated verbal warfare tonight over what Manager Red Dutton of the National League American "terme" New York Rangers' "heartlessness" when they plastered Amerks with a 7-1 defeat in the intra-city series last night. The game ended with the Amerks suffering another body-blow when Little Roy Worters, veteran Amerk goalkeeper, was helped into the dressing room suffering from a hernia. He will be operated on shortly and will be lost to his team for the season at least. Worters had not been well for some time. After the game Manager Dutton charged the Gotham Blueshirts showed no heart, that they knew Worters was suffering intense pain, yet kept blasting the puck into the American cage. Lester Patrick, head of the Rangers, retorted his team was totally unaware of Worters' injury—which did not become pronounced until late in the third frame following a pileup at the losing team's goalmouth. Dutton's suggestion that Rangers should have taken matters easy sent hockey's Silver Fox into a tantrum. "We always try to give the fans their money's worth," he said. "Neither myself nor my players knew Worters' predicament but even if we had would it have been our right to lay back? It certainly would not. The fans pay to see a show and a hockey match. Rangers will always try to provide them with both regardless of obstacles."

Ramblers Turn Back Falcons

CLEVELAND, Jan. 6—(AP)—Philadelphia Ramblers, scoring a barrage of four goals in the final period, defeated Cleveland's hapless Falcons 6-3 in an International-American League hockey game tonight. Philadelphia rolled to a 2-1 lead in the first period on goals by Cliff Barton and Hugh Gustafson. Cleveland got back in the game at 14:08 when Earl Roche and Yip Foster knocked in the rebound. The Falcons rallied in the second period and tied the score at 2-2 when Walt Breneman counted. Philadelphia quickly put the game on ice in the third on goals by Ed Ware, Charlie Mason and Joe Krol. Clint Smith made it six for the Ramblers. Bill Cunningham added another to the Cleveland total on an assist from Foster.

Stand Behind Maritime Branch

HALIFAX, Jan. 6—(CP)—The Halifax City Senior Hockey League voted tonight to support the Maritime Provinces Branch, Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, against the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association and the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association. The C.A.H.A. severed relations with the A.A.U. almost a month ago because of failure of the latter body to incorporate a four-point platform of the hockey body directed toward modification of amateur rules. The M.A.H.A. voted support of the parent body.

NEW YORK, Jan. 6—(AP)—On the anniversary of his father's death, 32-year-old Horace Stoneham today completed another chapter in the amazing story of New York Giants. Stoneham filed papers incorporating the Jersey City club of the International League as the Jersey Exhibition Company, and then, in discussing his hopes for the new Giants farm system, revealed the Giants really had been purchased for him by his father as a Christmas present in 1918. "My father came home one night just before Christmas that year, and at the dinner table asked me how I'd like to have him buy the Giants for me," young Stoneham said. "I thought he was kidding, but not long after Christmas he called me up and told me he actually had bought the club."
