PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND
(Canadian White Ribbon Tidings)

The other eight provinces will be glad to read something of the smallest province in the Confederation, not only because it is "The Island" to many, but because it is the only Prohibition Province we have in our wide expanse of country.

And so many of us have discovered to our sorrow, that matter of being a Prohibition Province cannot be taken for granted for a moment—and so the Islanders feel. The old and familiar trouble of bootlegging is rampant with them and their hearts are heavy that their good law is not being more strictly enforced. Moreover, the opponents of Prohibition are arguing as they have to the rest of us that Government Control will solve all ills. The women of the Unions feel very keenly that many, many voters are being influenced by the "much speaking" and are not at all investigating what Government Control has meant in other provinces. Cannot the other provinces do something to help them, and avert a catastrophe in this one bright spot, W. C. T. U. speaking?

There are nine Unions in the comparatively small area of the Island—six of them in Queen's County, three in Prince George's County, but none at all in Kings County. It is not being their Convention time, they gathered in three-point meetings to greet the Editor of "Tidings." Cornwall and North Wilshire had a meeting at Mrs. Gordon's, MacMillan's, the County and Local President, Beechwood Gardens, the charming place, a picture of which appeared in our October paper. Charlottetown, York, Cavendish and Fowling gathered in a church hall at Charlottetown for an evening meeting, with Mrs. Johnson, the local President, in the chair. And finally Summerside, Pictou and Edequie had a joint meeting in another church hall in Summerside with Mrs. Harrison MacFarlane, County President, leading. Mrs. Hazen Hornal, Provincial President was at all three meetings. Every group was alert and eager, full of questions, ready to co-operate.

The fact that there are no unions at all in Kings County, the most easterly county, and that there are as yet no organized Y's shows the field for organization. There is a number of the officers keenly conscious of this—time, experience and skill, they are fearful about. They are going at it, but it is another argument for our National Organizer.

One thing learned by the writer is that there are two W. C. T. U. women acting as very earnest Travellers Aids, one at Charlottetown and one at Summerside. Both of them are eager for help, look-line for ideas.

The three new Provincial Officers appointed for this year will be introduced in next issue by Mrs. Howard. In the meantime they are Mrs. Johnson, Superintendent of S. T. I.; Mrs. Fred Shaw, Superintendent of Marine and Light-houses; and Mrs. Deane, "Tidings" Page Editor. Mrs. Clark, the former Editor has taken over the L. T. L. Department.

All in all, it may be true that fox-ranching, general agriculture and potato picking are the chief means of daily bread in the Island, and therefore very important—but the cause of temperance, of peace, of moral reform, the task of making their province a "little bit of heaven," is very near and dear to these women by the sea. They will yet do it.
