Mr. Burden Heads P.E.I. Federation

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Suggests How Island Fisheries Should Develop

"You in Prince Edward Island fisheries have a challenge before you which you have met in the past and which we, in Ottawa, will be only too happy to help you to meet now," stated Mr. Alex Skelton, assistant Deputy Minister of Trade and Commerce at the Charlottetown Board of Trade dinner meeting at the Charlottetown last evening, president Frank Cutts presiding.

The guest speaker was introduced by Premier J. Walter Jones. Mr. Burke McInerney expressed the regret of the Minister of Fisheries and his Deputy at not being able to be present. Among other guests, which included the members of the P.E. Island Fisheries Federation, were Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Industry and Natural Resources, Prof. Frank MacKinnon, Messrs. S.H. Burhoe, past president and James E. Burden, newly elected president of the Federation, Clive Planta, manager of the Fisheries Council of Canada, and Howard McKelhan, United Maritime Fishermen.

Stating that he was here to learn, Mr. Skelton ventured to suggest that the Island fish industry should be developed along dual lines. The traditional farmer-fisherman must be assisted and strengthened and an off-shore fishing fleet should be developed. He believed that this programme would require more co-operation within the industry and more research over the whole field of fishing problems.

The speaker spoke of the work and organization of his Economic Research and Development Branch of the Department of Trade and Commerce in Ottawa and stated it acted as a two-way street for information to and from industry. He invited enquiries from all industries.

The speaker felt that Island fisheries might well emulate the Island farmers in producing a quality product which demanded premium prices throughout North America.

He stated that the picture of Canada's business "at the moment" was a booming economy with a few dark clouds beginning to show up.

Over the responsibility, the Dominion would suspend its rental regulations in that Province.

In centres where the shortage of rental accommodation is most acute, probably the majority of the landlords will take advantage of the maximum ceiling allowed," Mr. Abbott said.

"My estimate is that it will not be an across-the-board increase. This merely gives tenants and landlords the right to bargain within that range."

Prime Minister St. Laurent announced that all Provinces have accepted invitations to attend a Dominion-Provincial conference on constitutional matters to get underway in Ottawa Jan. 10.

Criticism of the rental policies during the debate came also from Ross Thatcher (CCF-Moose Jaw); T. L. Church (PC-Toronto-Broadview); Leon Baler (PC-Trois-Rivieres) and Henri Courtemanche (PC-Labelle).

The debate was continued at the night sitting. Members participating included Clive Gillis (CCF - Cape Breton South).

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Reviews Activities In Arts and Crafts

A year of exceptional activity was reviewed in the following report of Miss Frances E. Johnston, director of the Arts and Crafts Guild submitted at a board meeting of the Guild last evening.

"Our services and the number of persons using them continue to increase. In 1948, the attendance between January and October 31st reached 3,200. This year it has reached over 5,300.

"During the past month classes for all ages have been resumed for the 1949-50 season. Approximately 140 are enrolled in the regular children's classes, and some hundred others frequent the Art Centre from time to time during our Saturday Morning Open House. The names of a number of children who could not be accommodated in the classes after school have been put on a waiting list.

"We have abandoned the practice of having the school teachers decide which children should attend the classes. We are now leaving it up to the children to decide for themselves whether or not they want to come.

"With the exception of the Kindergarten class, all classes this season are predominantly handicraft in nature rather than painting or drawing. Thus we have the Rhythm Makers for 6-8 year olds, the Puppeteers for 9-11 year olds and the Toy-makers for 11-13 year olds.

"We have received a number of requests from teen-agers who would like instruction in drawing and painting. Unfortunately there are not enough days in the week to organize a class for them at the present time, but we may be able to make some arrangement for them after Christmas. It is important that we have a teen-agers class because some of the boys and girls who graduate from our children's classes are anxious to carry on with their art.

The majority of the students who attended our Monday night class for adults in figure drawing and still life last season have returned again this year. This speaks for the popularity of the class.

A new class for adults, Watercolor Painting for Beginners, was introduced on Friday and is proving a very worthwhile venture.

The Saturday morning open house flourishes as usual and this year, it has figured in our radio art class which has originated in the Art Centre on a number of occasions. A Halloween party was the feature on the last Saturday of the month.

"During October too, we had one of the most stimulating exhibitions of paintings that Charlottetown has seen in a long while - The Pegi Nicol MacLeod Memorial Exhibition. It was formally opened by Lieut. Governor J. A. Bernard at a pleasant ceremony. Because it is available for showing in the Maritimees for a very limited period we were only able to display it for ten days. During this time, some six hundred people saw it including fourteen school classes which visited the Art Centre with their teachers. Talks were given to all groups, and the last night of the exhibition a talk was given to members of the Guild.

"Two other exhibitions shown during October were "How Modern Artists Paint People" organized by the Museum of Modern Art in New York and loaned to us without charge by the Art Gallery of Toronto, and a group of paintings of Maritime artists which was organized and circulated by the Maritime

A talk was also given to Brackley Women's Institute on our children's programs and the possibilities of an artmobile service. "Visitors to the Art Centre this month came from Saint John, Halifax and Yarmouth. The regional librarians of P.E.I. also visited us. "A committee comprised of members of the Board and the general membership has been giving serious thought and held a number of discussions regarding the future housing of the Guild's program and will have a report to make very shortly.

"Thought is also being given to the preparation of a brief for the Royal Commission on National Development in the Arts, Letters and Sciences. It is gratifying to know that all organizations in P.E.I. interested in appearing before the Commission are willing to co-operate in the drafting of the briefs so that our ideas support rather than conflict with each other. Copies of the ideas the Arts and Crafts Guild plans to submit will reach the Commission members within the next couple of weeks for their comment before being finally submitted to the Commission."

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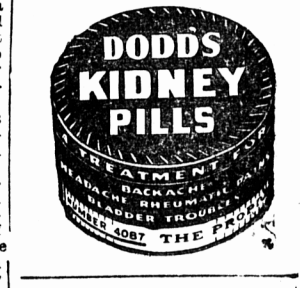
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Home Office Warns Britons of "Nerve Gas"

LONDON, Nov. 8 - (AP) - The Home Office warned Britons today that a "nerve gas," which caused death in convulsions, may be used against them if another war breaks out. It said the gas, in liquid form, will penetrate both clothing and skin, and thus will kill even if the victim is wearing a gas mask. The warning was contained in a training manual on chemical warfare published for Britain's new permanent Civil Defence Corps.
