1/4 c. beaten eggs
1/4 c. lemon juice
2 lbs. chopped parsley
1/2 lb. chopped onion
1/2 tsp. dry mustard
Salt, pepper, paprika

Sift together first 3 ingredients. Cut in shortening. Beat egg in measuring cup; add milk; make 1/2 cup; add to first mixture. Roll out 1/4 inch thick; lay flour board. Chop last 2 ingredients, spread on dough; roll up like a roll; cut and bake in hot oven (375° F.) 15 minutes. Serve with cheese sauce.

Cook's Corner

RHUBARB CREAM PIE

1 tablespoon butter
2 cups diced rhubarb
3/4 cup sugar
2 tablespoons cornstarch
2 eggs, separated
1/4 cup coffee cream
1/4 teaspoon salt

METHOD: Melt the butter, add the rhubarb and 1/2 cup of the sugar, cook slowly for about 10 minutes, or until the rhubarb is soft. Combine the remaining 1/2 cup sugar with the cornstarch, the well beaten egg yolks, the cream and the salt. Add to the fruit mixture and cook until this is thickener. Pour into a baked pie shell. Chill then top with a meringue made by beating the egg whites until stiff, but not dry, and gradually beating in 3/4 cup sugar. Bake in a moderate oven (325° F.) for about 12 to 15 minutes, or until the meringue is delicately browned.

Painting Over Nails

If one paints over rusty nails, they are likely to show through the paint as dark spots. This can be prevented by painting over them with aluminum paint and then applying a fresh coat of gloss paint. After the aluminum paint has dried thoroughly.
