BOLSHEVIK TROOPS MARCHING SOUTH

Along a 400 Mile Front Spurred on by German Soldiers Special to the Guardian PARIS, Dec. 15.—Bolshevik troops consisting of eleven infantry divisions and cavalry artillery are marching towards Central Europe on a front of nearly 400 miles, from a front of Finland to the Dnieper River, according to despatches from Berlin. \$150,000 FUND FOR DOVER PATROL

This Patrol Accounted for 30 German Submarines in Eight Months. (Special to the Guardian) LONDON, Dec. 15.—Vice-Admiral Keyes was presented with the freedom of Dover today. He said that the Dover patrol had accounted for 30 submarines between January 14 and 30th of September. A thirty thousand pounds sterling (\$150,000) fund has been started to which Lord Northcliffe donated £10,000 (\$50,000) to commemorate the patrol by the erection of two monuments on the cliffs and Cape Grisnez and to make provision for a home for Dover patrolmen.

COMMERCIAL AIRSHIPS FOR NEAR FUTURE

Range of 8000 Miles now Possible and Practicable for Passenger Travel. Special to the Guardian LONDON, Dec. 15.—The Civil Aeronautics Committee states that in the immediate future the committee states that in the immediate future the commercial airship offers a great advantage over the airplane particularly concerning passengers, where comfort and ease of navigation and safety are vital considerations. Airships now exist with a range of over four thousand miles and which can travel at a speed of 78 miles an hour. By running their engine slower a maximum range of 8,000 miles can be attained.

President Wilson Lands in France

BREST, Dec. 15.—President Wilson landed in France at 3.45 o'clock this afternoon amid a demonstration of popular enthusiasm and national sympathy. The President left Brest at 4 o'clock this afternoon for Paris where the heart of France will acclaim him tomorrow as the Nation's guest. The landing of the President was not only a remarkable spectacle with a notable naval pageant for its background but it also marked the first entry of an American President into personal contact with Europe and its affairs.

THE BRAVERY, DEVOTION AND SELF-SACRIFICE OF OUR SOLDIERS

Eloquently and Graphically Described by Colonel Beatty, Director of Chaplain Service, Before Large and Appreciative Charlottetown Assemblages.

Charlottetown had a distinguished visitor yesterday in the person of Colonel the Rev. William Beatty, Director of the Chaplain Service for Canada who arrived in Charlottetown on Saturday night. He delivered four addresses during his short stay in Charlottetown and the opinion was expressed by all who had the privilege of hearing him that he is one of the ablest, most earnest and impressive speakers that has ever visited this province. Colonel Beatty was a member of the first contingent and was with the men at Ypres when they stood between the Germans and the Channel Ports, and saved the Empire, and as he told in his several addresses, of the splendid deeds of the men from the land of the Maple Leaf, he stirred his hearers hearts to their depths.

His first address was given at the Mayor's banquet at the Victoria Hotel on Saturday evening. Speaking to the toast "Defenders of Our Empire" he said he accepted the toast for the men who have been bravely fighting for us in the front line. For his own part he said he was only a Chaplain but he was in a position to speak for the returned men. Among other things he said: "I am no pessimist regarding the returned soldier. You will find that every Chaplain who has been overseas comes home a booster for the men of our armies. No finer bodies of men were ever assembled than the armies of the allied nations who went to the front to fight for freedom. It is not a possibility for men to go through the experiences which these men have met at the front and come out the same men as when they went in. The men are coming home on a higher spiritual plane than that in which they went over. It is for the church to recognize this condition and take advantage of it in bringing the men into closer touch with the churches when they return."

More Soldiers Arrive At Portland, Maine

ELECTION FORECAST IN GREAT BRITAIN

Estimated Lloyd George Government Will Carry 435 Seats Giving Him a Clear Majority of 163.

(Special to the Guardian) LONDON, Dec. 15.—Balloting for the election of Parliament took place in Great Britain yesterday. Indications are that Premier Lloyd George will control a majority. The Daily Express estimates that his Government will win 435 seats, the Unionist 310 and the Liberals 125 while the opposition parties, including Labor will secure 372 giving the Prime Minister a majority of 163.
