CRICKET

(From Yesterday's Evening Guardian) At Victoria Park, Charlottetown, on Labor Day, an inter-provincial cricket fixture took place, a team from Amherst, N. S., meeting a team of the Phoenix C. C., of Charlottetown. The weather was ideal, the game was interesting, and play being keen, and was witnessed by a large number of spectators. Play commenced at 10.30 a.m. Charlottetown going first to bat. They were put out for a total of 41 runs. J. Gass, with 12 being top scorer. For the visitors, A. Illingsworth, who got six wickets for 22 runs, was the most successful bowler. The Amherst in their first innings made 42 runs, just one more than the local team's score. This was largely due to the bowling of A. Tomlins, who captured six wickets at a total cost of 21 runs. The Phoenix C. C. in their second innings played better and ran up a total of 69 runs, the top-scoring batsmen on this occasion being G. F. Hutcheson (18) and A. B. Cosh (12). Their captain Professor C. M. Wright, was the visitors' most successful bowler in this innings, taking four wickets for 13 runs. When the Amherst team went in for their second innings they had to get 69 runs to win, but thanks to the bowling of F. D'Ornellas and A. Tomlins, who respectively got five wickets for 14 runs and three for 31 runs, and thus Charlottetown secured victory by 37 runs. At 1 p.m. luncheon was served in one of the delightful groves of Victoria Park and was an enjoyable affair. Altogether the event was very successful and pleasant and was greatly enjoyed, the visitors expressing themselves in high terms of appreciation with their reception in Charlottetown, and delight with their trip, and pleasure with the beautiful situation of the cricket grounds.

ISLANDERS SUCCESSFUL AT LABOR DAY SPORTS

The Island athletic contingent which went to Pictou Labor Day to take part in the Labor Day Sports there gave a very creditable account of themselves. Parker Hooper, the Abegweit's well-known sprinter, got away with the 100 yards dash in 10.3-5 seconds, with F. Campbell, another Abegweit, second. Parker also capped the quarter mile run with Schofield, New Glasgow, second, C. Hughes of the Charlottetown Victorias, second. Time 56.00. The high jump was a close contest between Campbell and McDonald, of Pictou. They tied at 5 feet 9 1/2 inches and McDonald won the toss deciding the event. The boys' quarter mile run was a well contested race between two Charlottetown boys, C. H. McLean and J. Doyle, the former winning. The half mile run was another big prize for the Island getting, James Duffy of the Abbies' getting away with it, while Doyle came in a good second. "Joe" has "just come out" and gives great promise of being one of the Abbies' best coming men. Hilton of Halifax, who with several others of the Wanderers, was running dropped in a faint in this race. The pole vault was won by McDonald of Pictou, with Hughes, city, second. The track which is a cinder one is rather too heavy for fast racing. Schofield, New Glasgow, won the all round medal. Hooper, city, captured ten points, J. Doyle six, Duffy five and Hughes five.

IN MEMORIAM

MR. THEOPHILUS MOORE

The people of Charlottetown deeply regretted to learn yesterday that Mr. Theophilus Moore of this city had passed away on Monday morning. Mr. Moore had been in ill health and was given leave of absence from his duties in the Customs Department several weeks ago and he proceeded to the home of his son, Dr. E. P. Moore, of South Bend, Indiana. On arrival at his son's home he was compelled to retire to bed where he passed away. A slight operation was performed which relieved his heart and lungs for a short time, but his strength did not return.

Mr. Moore was the eldest son of the late Mr. George Moore, of the Bank of Prince Edward Island and a grandson of the late James Moore Esquire, who was for many years one of the first citizens of Charlottetown. He was born in the 6th of May, 1842, and was therefore in his seventy second year. For many years he was Assistant Collector of Inland Revenue in Charlottetown and on the 1st of May 1911 was promoted to the position of Collector.

He leaves to mourn their great loss and to cherish his memory a widow and four surviving children including Dr. Edwin P. Moore of South Bend, Dr. Garnet W. Moore of Seattle, Mrs. Arthur Douse and Miss Ethel Moore at home; and his brothers Colonel F. S. Moore and Mr. George M. Moore of the firm of Moore & McLeod.

A man of quiet manner, but of deep and warm feelings, the deceased gentleman was dearly loved by his family and highly esteemed by the community. He was from his youth a prominent member of the Methodist Church.

His remains will be accompanied to this City by Dr. and Mrs. Moore, arriving on Thursday evening. The funeral will be held on Saturday.
