Females Spies Are Worse Than Males

Arrested in New York as a German spy, Mme. Despina Davidovitch, died a few days ago on Ellis Island. She was a woman of unusual beauty which had been employed since the beginning of the war in efforts to lure secrets from British, French and Italian officers, and later on from Americans. Whether she had succeeded in discovering anything of much importance is not known, but she seemed admirably suited for her part. It is probable that her sudden death saved her from the firing squad and the blank wall which dealt with the other famous woman spy, namely, Mata Hari. She made one trip to many operations was given in The Mail and Empire some time ago. A famous dancer, a clever actress and a woman of keen intelligence and great personal charm, she succeeded in getting some advance information about British tanks from an infatuated British officer. Spies on the Stage

It seems that the Kaiser had found many useful spies in the theatrical profession, for it is recalled that a most dangerous agent of his was Mme. Elena Teodorina, a Roumanian singer, who was arrested in Milan last January through information supplied by the American secret service. Mme. Teodorina was a noted singer some twenty years ago, and achieved a triumph in Rome. Later on she repeated her successes in the United States and in South America. After the war began her frequent trips between Argentina and New York were noted, as was the fact that she had been seen in the entourage of the notorious Spurio Versenkt Luxemburg. She was watched, and eventually she was taken off a ship by a British destroyer. An examination of her luggage brought to light some common place looking documents, but when tested they revealed cipher writings. The singer was then given an examination by women attendants, and her skin treated with chemicals. This revealed the fact that the key to the cipher was concealed on her shoulder. How she could conveniently employ a key thus located is something that rather 'intrigues' the imagination.

Another woman of the stage is now under arrest in Paris on a charge of espionage.

espionage. This is Sumey Depsy, formerly a member of Bernhardt's company. Her husband, Emile Guiller, had been employed by a manufacturer of artificial limbs and had access to all hospitals. What attracted attention to his wife was her frequent visits to Switzerland, which has been a haven for German spies ever since the beginning of the war. It is in Switzerland that the spies who have been operating in France and Belgium and Italy gather to make their reports and receive their instructions. If Mme. Guiller is found guilty she will be shot, as in this war the sex of a spy is not considered. If it were it would not be the female of the species who would be treated with greater forbearance, since it has long been recognized that a woman spy is worth half a dozen men. She has opportunities that no man can ever have and has natural gifts of dissimulation that more men can never hope to emulate.

An Army of Women Spies

The same authority calculates that Germany has 100,000 women spies in its employ, and that they are quite as desperate and abandoned as they were in the days of the Franco-Prussian war. At that time a German female spy was ordered to become the wife of a French officer. She did so, in order that she might be brought into contact with General Ferre. She failed to make the general an admirer and was censured in Berlin for negligence. Berlin having no jurisdiction to censure Gen. Ferre for incompetence. One of the present chiefs of the German spy system is Frau von Schrieder, who is said to be an exceptionally gifted woman, with a special knowledge of American politics, which she acquired from a cultivation of American correspondents before the United States entered the war. In view of the fact that German women occupy a position at home somewhere between that of a slave and an upstart, it is amazing that they are so eager to serve the Fatherland at the risk of their own lives.
