THE SS Alameda has completed her season's work.

DR. McLAUCHLAN, St. Peter's Bay, was in the city Saturday.

Mrs. [Rev.] J. M. McLeod, left Saturday morning on return to her home in Vancouver, B. C.

SPECIAL to the Board of Trade from Port Mulgrave Saturday: Wind west, fine, six schooners bound north and S.S. Ghent passed south yesterday.

SYDNEY HAYDEN, of Charlottetown has passed the preliminary civil service examination, and has along with John D. McMillan and Ernest E. Wood, of Charlottetown, passed the qualifying examination at Ottawa.

MISSISS BLANCHE SMALLWOOD, Annie Pool and Hortense Phillips, of this city, and Miss Eva Wright, Summerside, students of Mount Allison Ladies' College, Sackville, arrived here by the Princess Saturday morning.

I. has been done and is being done—this stand and the same will no doubt strongly commend itself to capitalists.

CONSIDERABLE progress is being made by the city school teachers in their study of mineralogy under the superintendence of Mr. J. M. Duncan. The class meets fortnightly in Prince Street School. Already several "outsiders" have availed themselves of the privilege afforded in this important nature study.

MR. PAUL PAOLI, master and owner of the tug May Queen, while engaged in cutting away the ice about his steamer at Hogan's wharf, to place her in winter quarters, on Saturday afternoon, became suddenly ill and leaving his work started up the wharf. Becoming weak he fell and was here assisted by two men to Mr. R. McMillan's coal office. His son Samuel, employed in the office or Messrs. Poole & Lewis, was notified, who had his father hurriedly removed to his residence on Hillside St. A doctor was immediately summoned and on his arrival found the man dying. The priest was quickly brought to the scene, arriving just in time to administer the last rites of the church when death came at about 4 o'clock. Mr. Paoli was born in Corsica, was 63 years of age and had been a resident of Charlottetown about 35 years. He had followed the sea most all his life, always enjoyed the best of health, had eaten a hearty dinner on Saturday and was in his usual good spirits during the afternoon. The physician pronounced heart failure to be the cause of death. His wife and one son, are left to mourn his sudden and sad demise.

THE Northumberland took a large freight from this port Saturday which was valued at \$9,000, a part of which was 767 carcasses pork and a large quantity of smelts.

THE wrecked bark Bertino now lies off Brickmaker's Point and it is expected she will be left there for the winter, during which time a hole will be made in her bottom and the cargo of 330,000 superficial feet of lumber removed.

A CORRESPONDENT writes from Vancouver, B. C., that Jeremiah Bull who was confined to the hospital for several weeks with typhoid fever, is able to move around again. Mr. Bull was formerly in the employ of Prowse & Sons, Murray Harbor, and his many friends will be pleased to hear of his recovery.

THE Northumberland left Pictou at five a. m. yesterday and came at regular speed until off Governor's Island where she slowed up and finally came to anchor until 3 p. m. owing to the fog and large quantity of ice. She arrived at 4 o'clock bringing in tow the schooner J. McKeen which had been fast in the ice off Governor's Island. The crew report three other schooner stuck in the ice just outside the Block House near the mouth of the harbor, all bound for this port.

WE deeply regret to learn that Mr. James Bell, formerly of Cape Traverse, died at Moosemin, N.W.T., on Dec. 2nd, of congestion of the lungs. In early life Mr. James Bell had lived at Ingersoll, Ont. afterwards he went to Moosemin where he lived till his death. The deceased leaves two surviving brothers, Mr. Walter Bell and Mr. George Bell, both of Cape Traverse, also one sister, Mrs. Cornelius Howatt of St. Eleanors. Mr. P. H. Bell, of Summerside, is a nephew of the deceased. Pioneer.

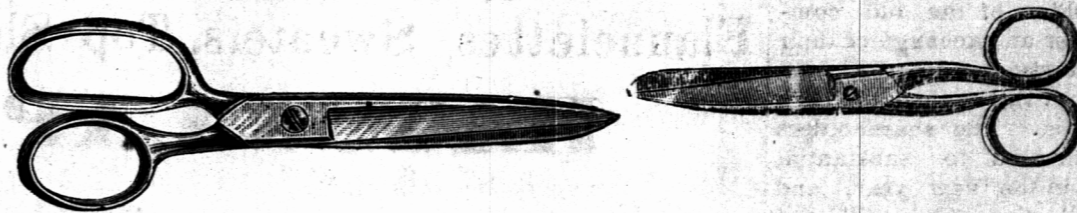

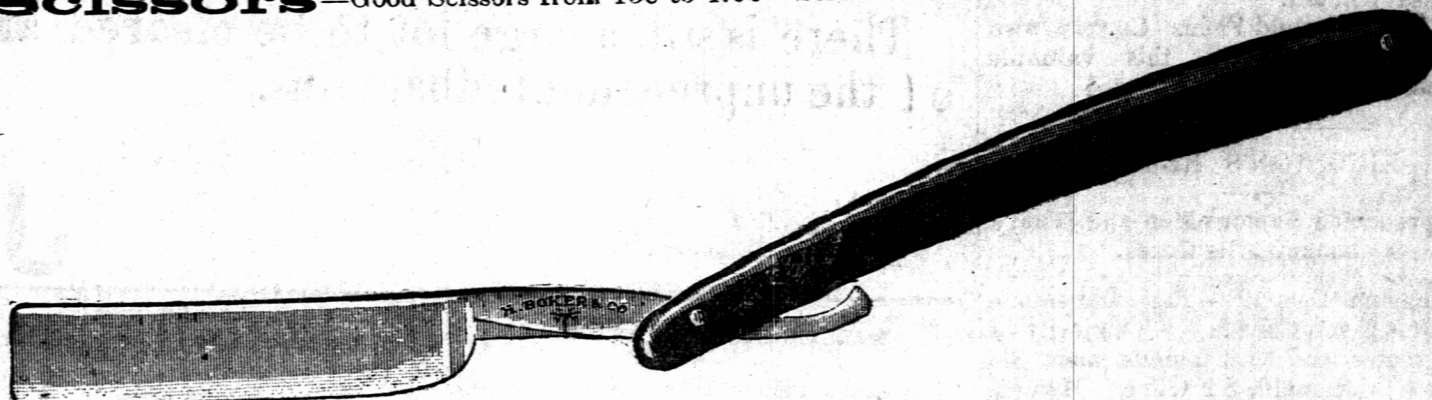
