Three of the assailants pummeled the victim, while a fourth kept watch and with the spasmodic assistance of one of the attacking party managed to discourage with pain, two-by-standers who dared to interfere. As soon as the police appeared, the disturbers disappeared.

In the June number of the Argosy is a story entitled The Fate of the Border Knight, a steamship which according to the story was disabled through a defect in her tail-shaft and sunk. CO-OPERATIVE LAUNDRIES FOR FARMERS.

The establishment of creameries and cheese factories has been the means of relieving the farmer and his wife of a great deal of profitless labor. A member of the Wisconsin Legislature proposes to still further lighten the drudgery of the farm house by establishing a steam laundry at every crossroads in the state, to which the farmers' washing and ironing may be brought every week. As the state is dotted with creameries and cheese factories it is proposed to make the laundry an accessory of these plants. The idea is a capital one, and we imagine it will meet with general approval.

The weekly washing is the greatest nuisance in the city household, and it is being rapidly hushed over to the steam laundries, the business of which has lately reached large dimensions. We do not see why the farmers' co-operative laundry should not also be a success. With modern laundry machinery, well-equipped buildings and appliances, the washing of the farm ought to be done with considerable saving in money and labor. The farmer himself enjoys all kinds of labor-saving devices. Why should not the farmer's wife receive equal consideration? The co-operative steam laundry will lessen the drudgery of the farm house, and give the farmer's wife more of the leisure and comfort enjoyed by her sisters of the city.
