THE EDITOR'S MAIL.

To Hon. D. Farquharson.

Sir,—Behold my desire is * * * that mine adversary had written a book. If Job was in our place and could see your letter he would be satisfied. You have been shielding yourself for some days behind a petition from, you say, "the most respectable temperance men in the town" asking you to pass a licence law. Now you boldly throw off the mask and claim credit for yourself for giving it to us and ignoring the men you duped into signing the petition. When Henry the Sixth was King of England he put men to death because they believed in the eucharist. When Edward the Fourth, his son, and immediate successor, came to the throne, he put them to death because they did not believe in the eucharist. I am of the opinion that had you lived in those troublesome days you would not have come under the condemnation of Henry nor would you have suffered at the hands of his son. You would have "changed the circumstances without compulsion." 'Tis said there is no zeal like that of a new convert and none so bitter against former associates. You are a living example of this. For the President of the Citizens' League, under whose good work you got at one time 22 liquor sellers in jail; one of the most extreme members of the Alliance; one who in 1898 helped frame the amendments we asked for; a man whose choicest phrase in speaking of license fees was "blood-money," for you to go over to the enemy in less than one year after and throw dirt through your pocket organ at your former associates—or such conduct and treachery to a cause followed by so many sacrifices are you not yourself astonished and amazed?

Your letter was written to deceive THE GUARDIAN readers. It abounds with falsehood and misrepresentation; bungling, and miserably written, it implies that the temperance people repudiated the Scott Act and gave permission to sell by giving the Liquor regulation Act. No such thing! When the Scott Act was repudiated the dealers had a natural, unrestricted right to buy and sell and the Regulation Act of 1892 and all amendments asked for ever since sought to curtail that right. I defy you to name one provision of "permission." Every one is restrictive. You give the impression that you gave, unsolicited, early closing, fines for treating, the majority, in block clause, etc. These you took from our amendments. We asked you to close all saloons at seven o'clock, the same time as do dry

goods and grocery stores. Instead of this, you made it ten o'clock. Was this in the interest of "our boys who are compelled to face the tempter?" We asked you to allow no oysters to be sold with liquors. This you refused. We asked you to prevent treating; you did this but reduced the fine to a minimum and mutilated the amendment so that any boy can buy a bottle and treat in any place except in the room where purchased, and in the face of this you have the boldness to say "no man can treat another."

We asked you to prohibit sale to minors and you fixed the limit at 18, the most dangerous time in a boy's life.

We asked you to prohibit girls selling in saloons. This you refused.

We asked you to shut up the clubs. This you refused, notwithstanding the fact that you say in your letter that you have the proof that they play cards and drink liquor Sunday and Monday in eight of these places. Does this include the one your Attorney General belongs to and other members of your cabinet?

You shamefully ask us what are we doing, and add "nothing but words." We reply we asked you for legislation to shut them up and you refused to do it.

You never encouraged us to ask for Provincial Prohibition; it was only for the city and this, like so many of your "broad gauge" temperance schemes, we do not entertain.

If you believe in Provincial Prohibition, why did you not give it to us? You said in Stanhope Hall if Laurier did not give us prohibition you would, and you cited a letter from the Minister of Justice as your authority.

You take high ground against anonymous writers for a man who has had a fling at about every man you have quarrelled with (and they are legion) over the non de plume of "Fair Play." Give others credit for as much modesty as you have. This is not asking much.
