

ALLAN LINE TO GIVE SERVICE

Weekly Between Canada And France And C.P.R. May Put On Line To Antwerp Connecting With French Ports

OTTAWA, Jan. 17.—(Special)—The Allan Steamship Company are arranging to put on a weekly steamship service between Canada and France. The details have not yet been worked out, but it is understood the Company believe that under the new Franco-Canadian tariff there can be sufficient trade developed for a weekly service. There are good prospects for the development of a large passenger

business. It is understood that the C. P. R. is considering seriously the position and of putting on a first class steamship service between Canada and Antwerp with connection at one of the French ports. This would give Canada two direct lines to France, so that treaty tariff rates could be easily obtained by both Canadian and French merchants.

STRATHCONA ON ALL RED SCHEME

LONDON, Jan. 16.—Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal, in an interview last night on the shipping situation, said that he regarded the agreement recently entered into by North German Lloyd and the Hamburg American steamship lines, as likely to precipitate a repetition of the situation of a few years ago, when the American attack upon their shipping resulted in the granting of a subsidy to the Cunard Company by the British government and the building of the Lusitania and the Mauretania. He considers that the German agreement is further justification for the subsidizing of an "All Red" transportation line to encircle the globe, which had been strongly advocated last summer. The M. P. HONOLULU, Jan. 16.—A local newspaper prints an interview with Viscount Aoki, Japanese Ambassador to America, in which Viscount Aoki is quoted as follows: "I do not approve of manual laborers going to America. They cannot expect after Japan's long isolation to establish themselves in any western country. Duty and opportunity are in Asia, Korea and Manchuria." Viscount Aoki also expressed himself as opposed to Japanese seeking naturalization in America for the reason that citizenship is only needed by those who contemplated permanent residence.

BRUTAL HUSBAND'S LONG SENTENCE

CORNWALL, Jan. 18.—Joseph Ashworth was found guilty here Saturday of an attempt to murder his wife and sentenced to twenty years in penitentiary. Ashworth's attack was a particularly brutal one. He assailed his wife with a stove lifter and when she succeeded in wresting this from him he drew a knife, and cut her over the face. In striving to protect her throat, Mrs. Ashworth had her finger cut off. A young son who came to his mother's assistance had been badly hacked. Ashworth's plea was insanity, but experts pronounced him mentally sound.

IS THE OLDEST BELL RINGER

LONDON, Jan. 16.—The master ringer of Lincoln Cathedral (W. R. Stiles) has just been entertained at dinner by his friends in honor of his attaining his jubilee as a ringer. Yet he is now only 67 years old. During the half century he has climbed the belfry stairs in St. Hugh's tower so often that the total is equal to 375,000 steps, and there is every hope that he will go on to complete the million. Ringing during the episcopate of three bishops, Mr. Stiles has rung on 160 occasions for the reigning monarch. He has rung at the installation of seven deans, five precentors, five chancellors, four sub-deans and two archdeacons.

The total holdings of these shareholders amount to \$500,000, and if they succeed in being ranked as creditors instead of shareholders, the assets of the York Loan will be very materially diminished.
