BERLIN, Oct. 31.—The Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung says semi-officially that the reply of the German Government to the note from the Supreme Council at Paris, demanding the surrender of German ships sold to Holland during the war, will probably be in the negative.

CONCRETE SHIPS PROVE TO BE A BIG SUCCESS

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—Concrete ships of the 2,500 deadweight tons are a success, while larger ones are still an experiment, according to Captain C. A. McAllister, of the American Bureau of Shipping, who yesterday made public the results of the findings of the Technical Committee of the bureau at a meeting held in India House.

The concrete ship is heavier than one of steel, he said, but lighter than a wooden one and cheaper to repair than either. It cost about \$18, with the labor of any one who can plaster a hole full of mud, to repair the same size hole in a concrete vessel that would cost \$1,800 to repair if it were a wooden or steel ship. Because of this and other advantages the concrete ship, it can safely be said, has come to stay for service in home waters. Steel ships will continue to be preferred for ocean traffic.

The findings were based principally on observation of the Faith, the concrete ship which has now travelled on all the waters of the world since she was launched on the Pacific coast.
