COLONEL SAM HUGHES HAS A NARROW ESCAPE. KIMSTON, Ont., June 21-There was nearly a panic at the Barrfield Camp yesterday when it was found that the ball ammunition had been served to the 8th and 9th Brigade Regiment for tactical scheme.

When the men began to fire, bullets whistled through the camp grounds and there was great alarm. Finally the tactics were temporarily stopped and the ammunition was recalled. The Hon. Sam Hughes was in camp as the troops were starting their manoeuvres, but left almost immediately, else Canada might have been without a Minister of Militia, had one of the stray bullets come his way. It is thought that the ammunition might have been issued through the stores by a misleading table, or that volunteers might have used some of their range cartridges. A Board of Inquiry is looking into the matter. The wonder is that there were not some casualties.

IMPERIAL NAVY POLICY. LONDON, June 20-In the House of Commons yesterday, Winston Churchill said advantage will be taken of the visit of Canadian Ministers to confer with them on the Imperial naval policy to give them the fullest information.

The Speaker has ordered the overseas M.P.'s to have access to the House of Commons lobby and other special privileges at Westminster.

DIAMOND CASE STILL OPEN. CHICAGO, June 21-Jack Johnson, champion heavyweight pugilist and his wife, Emma Johnson, were indicted by the Federal Grand Jury today for smuggling a diamond necklace bought abroad. Several unsuccessful attempts were made by the pugilist to settle the case by the payment of part of the duty and penalty. The necklace is valued at \$3,000 and with the penalty the amount due the Government reaches \$6,000.

BELGIAN ORDER FOR GOUIN. QUEBEC, June 20-Sir Lomer Gouin, Premier of Quebec, has received the following message from J. Dailyvignon, Minister of Foreign Affairs, Brussels: "It has pleased the King, my august sovereign, to name you, on my recommendation, grand officer of the Order of Leopold II. I have the honor to forward you the insignia of this decoration, as well as an authentic copy of the warrant of nomination on the 21st of this month."

THREATENED WITH BLOCKADE. EDMONTON, Alb., June 21-Alberta is threatened with a grain blockade, more serious than that of the previous year, is the belief of Hon. Charles Stewart, minister of municipalities. Mr. Stewart declared that he had found the crops almost uniformly excellent throughout the province. The growth is three weeks in advance of last year at a similar period, and the present prospects are that the harvest will be fifty per cent. greater.

THREE TITANIC VICTIMS PICKED UP BY STEAMER

NEW YORK, June 22-The captain of the steamer Ilford, which has just reached Hamburg from Galveston, reports having found the bodies of three Titanic victims 370 miles from the spot where the liner sank. Reports found on the bodies showed that they were three stewards living in the Isle of Wight. The bodies were buried at sea.

MAN RESTORED TO LIFE.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., June 19-After a pulmotor had been operated for more than four hours today in an effort to save the life of Sween Swanson, 27 years old, a lineman of the Union Electric Light & Power Company, physicians declared the young man had a chance to recover.

The battle for the life of the young man began after 2,200 volts of electricity had passed through his body, leaving his hanging head downward from the wires for an hour before his body was removed. He was apparently dead and stayed in that condition after the pumping of oxygen began. At the end of an hour an indication of blood circulation was shown. The flesh then resumed almost a normal appearance and finally faint pulsations were detected at the arteries in the neck and wrist. When the pulmotor had been working an hour and a half Dr. Brooks said the evidence of returning life was more marked, and he became optimistic over the possibility of Swanson being brought back to life. The work was continued for four hours, when the use of the pulmotor was abandoned to allow the heart to recover its natural action.

TO EXHUMED FIVE BODIES.

CHICAGO, June 19-Arsenic in large quantities has been found in the liver of Arthur Lindloff, whose mother, Mrs. Louise Lindloff, is under arrest in connection with his death, according to a report Prof. Walter S. Haines submitted to Coroner Hoffman today.

After receiving the report Coroner Hoffman obtained an order for the exhumation of the bodies of William Lindloff and Alma Lindloff, husband and daughter, respectively, of the accused woman.

Mrs. Lindloff's arrest followed the sudden death of her son on June 13. Five deaths that have occurred in her family in the last three years are to be investigated.

The investigations will spread out to Milwaukee, where two bodies will be exhumed.

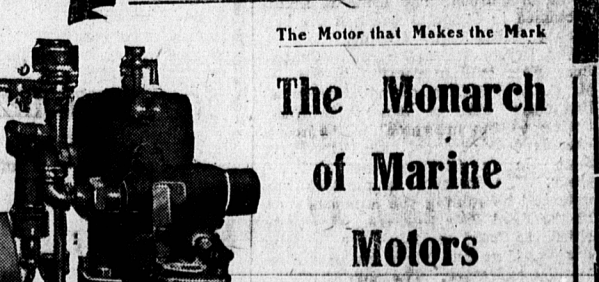

Hobhouse, Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster, and William Redmond. Mrs. Dave Wilcox, leader of the local militant suffragettes, was found in an ante-room disguised as a man, wearing a soft felt hat, a dust-coat, and trousers. She was discovered by the police and ejected. She was afterwards followed through the streets by a large crowd, and was roughly treated and kicked about the shins. Eventually she got away in a tram-car.
