CANADA BEGINS CHRISTMAS SEASON

OTTAWA, Dec. 28.—Canada began
her Christmas season with the unique
record of having not a single trade
dispute within her borders to mar
the spirit of peace and good will.

The Department of Labor reports
that at the end of last month three
labor disputes in the country report-
ed during November, had all been set-
tled. These disputes involved only
three firms and 819 employees. The
loss of time in working days was 5,
715, compared with 37,880, for the
preceding month, and 19,860 for Nov-
ember last year.

The homestead entries for the first
nine months of the present year to-
talled 26,347, compared with 23,941
for the first nine months of 1907.
