MAY BE SMALLPOX CASE

Schooner with a Suspected Case on Board Quarantined at Georgetown.

The announcement made yesterday evening that a sailor on board the schooner Monarch, Georgetown, had symptoms of smallpox was heard with a great deal of alarm. Upon inquiry last night THE GUARDIAN learned that during the storm of Wednesday the schooner Monarch arrived in port from Lunenburg for a cargo of produce. The vessel was brought to anchor in the stream and members of the crew came ashore and visited the Customs House and while there they stated that one of the seaman had been sick since Monday. Fearing that something might be wrong Dr. Stewart went aboard and found that the patient had symptoms resembling those of smallpox. The doctor after coming ashore acquainted the authorities with the state of affairs and Archibald Mc-

Donald who has attended smallpox cases on previous occasions was engaged to look after the patient. There is a great deal of doubt as to the cause of the man's illness, owing to the fact that it is smallpox and if the patient has been ill since Monday as stated, the rash ought to be visible. At any rate the remainder of the crew have been quarantined to the fore-castle of the ship and the patient is being made comfortable in the cabin and Dr. Stewart states that it may be two or three days before the disease, if smallpox, will develop.

It is understood that yesterday Premier Farquharson telephoned Hon. Malcolm MacDonald and Hon. D. Gordon to take all necessary steps to isolate the suspected case.

A meeting of the Council of the Charlottetown Board of Trade was called yesterday morning for the purpose of meeting with a delegation from the Summerside Board of Trade in reference to the plying of the Steamer Stanley on the Tormentine-Summerside route. After considerable discussion the following resolution was passed: Resolved in the opinion of this board that if freight and passenger rates can be arranged from all points on the P. E. Island Railway to all points on mainland via Summerside and Cape Tormentine same as those now in force via Georgetown and Picotou for winter traffic and if ample shed room provided at Cape Tormentine this Board would approve of a trial being made of the Summerside and Cape Tormentine route by the S. S. Stanley. The Summerside delegation consisted of Hon. R. C. McLeod, R. Hunt and G. S. Hinton. After the passing of the resolution Hon. R. C. McLeod thanked the members of the Charlottetown Board of Trade for their co-operative spirit.

THE NEW STATION

Some of Charlottetown's Business Men

EXPRESS THEIR VIEWS FOR AFRICAN SERVICE

Upon the Location of the New Depot—Central Place is Desired.

Yesterday afternoon a GUARDIAN representative waited upon a number of the merchants in reference to the most suitable location for the proposed Railway depot.

Mr. Aitken of Carvell Bros. said: "If we cannot get it as far as Queen Street I would like to see it as far west as possible. The extension of the Railway line along Water Street is an actual necessity, and must be done sooner or later."

Mr. Mark Wright of Messrs. Mark Wright & Co. in referring to the location aid that the depot should be in a central place, at least as far west as the Hotel Davies corner.

Mr. Horace Hazard when waited upon said that he did not consider it advisable to make it a hard and fast rule as to where the new station should be located. It is admitted on all sides that a new station is very much needed. He thought that all we should do just now is to stand together and press our claims. The matter of location would be better to stand over for the present. He considered that either the Round House corner or the corner opposite the Hotel Davies would be very suitable.

Mr. Jas. Paton thought that the most suitable place was at the head of Steam Navigation Co's wharf. Failing that the corner now occupied by the Round House would be the next most suitable place.

Mr. Geo. E. Hughes suggested that a public meeting of the citizens be called, or better that the matter be left with the Charlottetown Board of Trade. The location is a matter for the citizens to decide.
