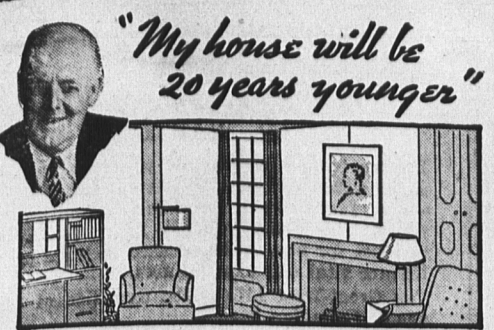

CROP REPORT

In southern Saskatchewan seeding is practically completed. Fairly general rainfall was welcomed on the 24th but there are no reports of damage from drought or any other source. Winds have been very drying to the top soil. In central and northern Saskatchewan there was only scanty rainfall until the 27th when rain began to fall which greatly improved the moisture situation. Cool weather with high winds has continued and frosts have again hurt flax in some districts west of Saskatoon. Some reseeding is necessary. Seeding is practically completed. In Alberta the outlook is more encouraging as a result of fairly general showers but previously drought and cool weather. As a result of frost damage there is considerable reseeding of coarse grains. All seed should be in the ground by the end of the month. In northern areas of Alberta wheat seeding has been completed. There is a general demand for more rain but crops are not yet suffering to any extent.
