BURMAH'S GREAT OIL WELL

Home again after three years of geological investigation of oil fields in India, Dr. B. R. MacKay, of Cornwall, Ont., formerly of the geological survey branch of the Dominion Government, was a passenger on board the S. S. Empress of Canada, the new champion of the Pacific and the holder of the blue ribbon for her record trip from Yokohama to Vancouver, made in 8 days, 10 hours and 55 minutes at an average speed of 20.6 knots per hour.

Dr. MacKay and five other members of the Dominion geological service, were engaged by Lord Cowdray in April, 1920, to proceed to India and investigate the oil formations. In Burma, which he said, was the chief producer of oil in the British Empire, all the producing wells were on one area three quarters of a mile square. There were no fewer than 4,000 wells on this tract and all the upper structures gave the area the appearance of a dense forest.

Speaking of political conditions, Dr. MacKay stated that the unrest was greatly exaggerated in the foreign press. "There is nothing wrong in India," he said. "Once the Government showed a firm hand in putting down Ghandi and his followers the whole thing collapsed."
