With regard to the volunteers from this Province who will likely be required to take part in the celebration in connection with the throwing open of the Plains of Abraham at Quebec this year, it is probable that all the men of the 4th Regiment Canadian Artillery will go, and that half of the men composing the other forces of this Province will have the opportunity to attend the function. That is half the 82nd Battalion, half the Light Horse, and half of the other branches of the service represented here. This will give a large contingent from this Province and no doubt a good selection will be made that will do credit to Prince Edward Island when they are lined up with the other forces of the Dominion on the historic battle field, where one hundred and fifty years ago, Wolfe gave up his life in the hour of victory that won Canada to the British Crown after many years of warfare.

The latest Militia Orders announce that Lieut. W. H. Tidmarsh has been transferred to the Corps Reserve of the 82nd Reg.

On motion of F. L. Lewis, Acadia, seconded by Don Cameron, Dalhousie, Mount Allison's protest against Jas. "Toby" McDonald, of St. Francis' Xavier team, was sustained by the Inter-collegiate Hockey League executive at Truro, Lewis, Cameron, Russel, Mount Allison, and Tobin, Kings, voted in favor of sustaining the protest, with Doyle, St. F. X., contrary. The U. N. B. was not represented. The meeting was quite warm at times. Sam Doyle, (a Charlottetown boy) as chairman executive to put a motion sustaining the protest, but his decision was appealed from, the votes declared against. Mount Allison showed that through January McDonald had played with the Sydney Nationals, and consequently, could not have been attached to St. Francis' Xavier, as required by the league rules. It was decided to annul the St. F. X. Mt. Allison game for the championship and that the Hewson trophy should be unawarded for 1908.
