### THE CZAR'S VISIT TO FRANCE

The youthful Czar is now making his second visit to France, his first visit having been paid in 1896 comparatively near the beginning of his reign. The French Government and people were very enthusiastic over the visit of five years ago, and are quite as much so to-day. Since the disaster of 1870 France has felt the need of a strong ally, and Russia is undoubtedly strong, if not impregnable. So a strong friendship has sprung up between the greatest of European despotisms and the greatest of European republics. There may or may not be a formal alliance existing between the Governments of Paris and St. Petersburg, but the Czar has spoken of France as "this friendly allied nation," and that implies much. The best part of continental Europe may be considered as in the Triple and the Dual Alliances.

The Triple Alliance of Germany, Austria-Hungary and Italy was brought about by Bismarck in 1883 to check Russia and France. It has been from time to time renewed and stands in full force today. It has on the whole tended to maintain peace. Its terms are defensive, the three allied powers being pledged to mutual support in certain contingencies only. One natural effect of the Triple Alliance has been to bring about closer relations between France and Russia. There are no apparent indications that either the Czar or President Loubet contemplate a policy of aggression in the near future. The Czar is believed to be personally a peaceful ruler, and the interests of both nations for the present would no doubt be best served by peace. Russia requires time to complete her great highway to the East and France is cumbered with an enormous debt and the load of a vast military establishment.

The most extraordinary precautions have been observed to secure the personal safety of the Czar and Czarina during their visit. Landing at Dunkirk, in the extreme north of France, the Czar has been wholly surrounded by the military and police. In his journey southward to Compeigne, a distance of 120 miles by rail, the track was closely picketed by soldiers on both sides throughout the entire distance. This unprecedented measure is probably in part the result of the recent murder of President McKinley. Be that as it may it is greatly to be desired that the Czar's life shall be preserved. The line of succession is such that a much less desirable ruler would succeed to the throne in the event of his removal.

Some contractors who erected temporary grand stands along the route of the royal procession in Ottawa found the venture a losing one. The stands were left bare while the people moved with the procession.

The list of Canadians who have received titular distinctions from the crown and who are still living includes seven members of the Peerage, five Barons, three Knights Grand Cross of St. Michael and St. George, seventeen Knights Commanders of the same order, twelve Knights Bachelors, thirty-four Companions of St. Michael and St. George and five Companions of the Bath, making a grand total of sixty-eight.

We farmers have perhaps submitted too long to the dictates of intriguing persons like "West Queens" who write under assumed names and will advise when their advice is not required, will dictate when their dictation is despised. Let the farmers and business men of West Queens decide who their representative in the House of Commons shall be. Mr. Hassard is a business man, of unquestionable integrity and has the confidence and esteem of every one with whom he does business and after all is not the conduct of one in private business the best index to the man? I have no confidence whatever in that one who makes politics a pretext and fills his private coffers while he shouts loyalty to his party. The trickster and wire-puller ought to be discouraged, integrity and good business ability must count before everything else. We love and respect a man not because he occupies an office or represents a constituency but that in our dealings with him we find that he is honorable and true.

If it were not so my selfish greedy fellow without honor, without any great ability and with nothing but selfishness to recommend him would be continually imposing himself upon the electorates. "West Queens" wants us farmers to ride the old horse that has reared up and down West River so long. Did it not occur to "West Queens" that the old horse might be tired, winded and unable to carry us any more further? If for one do not care to be left in the distance and when I see a new horse full of life and energy and true as steel to his master I full like leaping into the new saddle and abandoning the old. We want a live horse and I think my fellow farmers of West Queens who are by all means the arbiters in this matter will join with me in the cry for a live candidate, a true candidate, such as Mr. Hassard, in the coming contest. Both the Dominion and Local Government have provided well for the old horse. Let him then be content and not presume too much, lest vaulting ambition o'er leap itself, etc.
