NOVA SCOTIA SCHOONER SUNK

HALIFAX, Nov. 22.—Just a few days out from Cork, Ireland, bound for Nova Scotia, the three masted schooner "Corenso," Capt. Albert Rafuse, of Lunenburg, has been sunk. Whether it was by a submarine or otherwise is not known here. The crew were saved.

"Vessel sunk, crew saved," was the laconic wording of the cable received by Capt. Rafuse's wife, Mr. G. U. Rafuse of this city is a brother of the skipper of the "Corenso." The schooner "Corenso" was bought at Sydney last autumn by parties in Cork, Ireland, and recently took a cargo of fish from Newfoundland to Cork. It was on her return voyage that she was lost.

All the world knows Hindenburg, Germany's iron-man, the hero of the Masurian swamps, a colossal wooden statue of whose stands opposite the Reichstag building in the Siegesallee, the avenue of victory in Berlin's tiergarten, but who is Ludendorff? He is Germany's man of mystery— the grim, inscrutable, silent man, whose picture is on sale in every shop, whose name is in every mouth, but whose real personality is hidden even from his own countrymen. He is Hindenburg's right hand man.

ISLAND SOLDIER GRIEVOUSLY WOUNDED

Dan Clarey of Milltown Cross in Hospital Shot Through Ankles.

Mrs. John Clarey, of Milltown, has received the following letter from Mr. Mortimer, who had visited her son Dan, in the Bath, England, War Hospital:

Dear Mrs. Clarey:—I was in Bath, Somerset, three weeks ago, where I met your son, who is an invalid in the Bath War Hospital. When there I promised him I would write you as soon as I reached Montreal, and give you some account of him. Poor boy! He is rather badly wounded, having been shot through both ankles, and while I was with him he suffered very great pain. I am hardly able to write to you; I hope, please God, his feet will be spared to him.

But it was too soon to tell when I left, but you can rest assured everything will be done for his comfort. Poor boy! He suffered very much, but was very brave, and complained only of want of sleep. My people who live near the hospital, have promised to look after him while he is there, and from a letter I received, and of which I enclose part, you will see references to him. Any further news I receive from them I shall pass on to you. I send my most sincere sympathy to you. I am, dear Mrs. Clarey, Yours most faithfully, WILLIAM MORTIMER.

Miss Teresa Clarey, Milltown Cross, has also received the following letter:

Dear Miss Clarey:—Being a Canadian, I am enquiring for Canadians this afternoon at the Bath War Hospital. I met your brother, Dan Clarey, He asked me to write to you and tell you that he is doing well. He has been wounded in the foot and ankle, but there is no prospect of amputation. The ankle wound is very painful, and I expect all he has gone through has affected his nerves. I did not stay long with him, as he was in great pain, and strangers are very busy at such times. He is in a good modern hospital and is getting every care. We are all so sorry, and yet it is gratifying for our Canadians, and proud of them, I will see him in another week, and shall let you know how he is getting along.

There are forty-eight Canadians in that hospital now, and we are taking the greatest care of them. I am vice president of the hospital, and take a special interest in my countrymen. Your brother looked such a splendid fellow.
