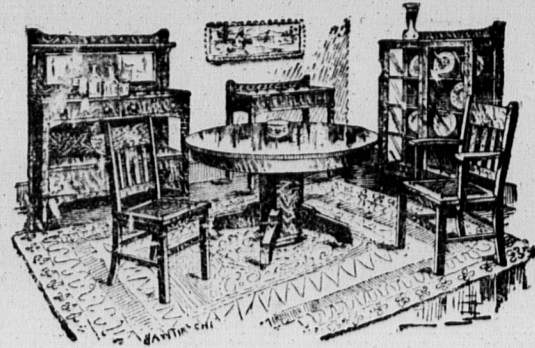

SIR WILFRID'S VISIT AND THE TARIFF.

When Sir Wilfrid Laurier last visited the Northwest on a political speaking tour fifteen years ago, he was leader of the Opposition, and the party had been long out of power. He returns as a long-term Premier, and with greatly enhanced prestige on that account. His fame has grown greatly in the meantime, and the Northwest has grown greatly in wealth and population as well. But there are a goodly number of old-time Liberals still living in the Northwest who remember the Liberal Chieftain's former visit, the economic doctrines he then proclaimed, with which they were delighted at the time and how they had rallied to his support in the election of 1896.

The people of the Northwest had their love for high protective tariffs; nor have they now. Protection cannot raise the price of their grains and live stock in the great markets of the world to which these products must be sent for sale. Protection does increase the cost of the farm-machinery, dry goods, hardware and other useful things which the Northwest farmer or citizen must buy. Hence the preference of the Northwesters then and now for a low tariff. And in 1896 and before the general Liberal policy stood for a tariff for revenue only, as low as would provide for the public services of the country, while more than one of the prominent Liberal speakers of the time advocated free trade as it is in England, "all-wool and a yard wide" and denounced protection as an accursed thing, the last vestige of which must be destroyed.

But times and opinions change, and sometimes circumstances may justify a change of opinion and of policy. It may be doubted, however, whether the opinions of the Northwest people

in regard to the tariff has changed so much as the Liberal policy has changed since 1896. We still have a high protective tariff, modified to some extent by the British preference, but otherwise much as it was before. True, the Liberal tariff policy such as it is has since carried the country in three elections, which is a strong point in its favor. But the Northwest represents and is conscious of a much greater voting power than it had fourteen years ago. Sir Wilfrid may be called upon to explain to the Northwest why the tariff has not been made lower and the protective principle eliminated. And if anybody can explain it in happy phrase he is the man, albeit the task might be rather hard for another.

But in any case the Northwest must take his medicine. He can gain nothing by skitting from Laurier to Borden. He may perhaps protest that the tariff is still so high that a loss of the big manufacturers, formerly Conservative, have turned Liberal, and in turn he may be reminded that the Conservative policy is, if anything, still more protectionist than the Liberal policy. On this ground Sir Wilfrid may still claim his following in the Northwest, though all the former talk of low tariff or free trade must appear as a word of promise not very well kept even to the ear, and wholly broken to the hope. Some verbal favor now for reciprocity with the United States may also exercise a mollifying influence upon the Northwest free traders. There are, reasons, it would seem, why Sir Wilfrid should both walk and speak warily while in Prairie Land, but he is a past master at that sort of thing, and will no doubt give a good account of himself even if compelled to discuss the tariff.

EARL GREY IN A SUPERLATIVE MOOD.

Earl Grey on his arrival in Canada six years ago speedily captivated the Canadian people and in turn was himself captivated. His attitude toward and his devotion to the Dominion has been that of an ardent lover to his mistress. And his fervor has not diminished with the years of his residence in this country. Rather it has become warmer and more intense. His recent letter to the Standard of Empire, written in London, makes this clear. We quote a passage from the casual abstract of this remarkable letter:

"He says, the Canadians are a sane, sober, strenuous, earnest people, a patriotic, invincibly industrious people, worshipping no false gods, steadily and surely, with their arms wide open alike to opportunities and dangers, building up between the Atlantic and Pacific, the greatest nation that has ever been, within the greatest Empire that has ever been."

"There is more of the same sort, but let this suffice. It reads at the first blush a little like a fourth of July oration delivered across the border, with the word "Canadian" inserted in place of "American." But it is something more and something better than that.

True, we may hardly know ourselves under all the noble titles, attributes, and honors that Earl Grey has bestowed upon us. He has written in the superlative mood of praise and laudation. Yet we cannot doubt his sincerity. His letter to the Standard of Empire accords with all that he has said, with his every act and deed since he came to this country. He speaks as a genuine lover of Canada, whose steady affection has been the growth of years and has now become intense.

"Building up the greatest Nation that has ever been, within the greatest Empire that has ever been!" These are strong words. But they are also patriotic words, tender of a great faith in Canada and in the British Empire. Such faith wrongs no one and menaces no one, but it is a tower of strength to the nation that possesses it. It is a faith that under Providence has given so wide dominion to those little islands of the Northern sea, for the benefit and instruction of the world. It is the faith of the Canadian people in themselves and in their country which is rapidly making Canada a great nation. Wherefore we have cause to thank Earl Grey for his inspiring words.

THE PRIZE FIGHT AND MOVING PICTURES.

According to the general verdict of the civilized world the prize fight is a demoralizing thing. It has long been excluded under heavy penalties from most Christian lands, including the United Kingdom and the Dominion of Canada. The question now arises whether a reproduction in moving pictures of the brutal and degrading spectacle at Reno shall or shall not be permitted in this country. As is well known every preparation has been made for this, the pictures were taken at the time of the fight and for the exclusive right to take them, and to sell or lease them to the moving picture theatres an almost fabulous sum was paid. The chief participants in the fight are to share in the proceeds.

As above stated, Canada does not permit prize fights within her borders.

ers or allow them to be advertised. If those pictures are allowed to be reproduced in Canada, not only will the widest possible publicity be given to the degrading spectacle, largely before the youth of the land, but Johnson and Jefferies will be rewarded with a benefit in good Canadian money to the tune of tens of thousands of dollars for doing and suffering what they did at Reno. This can hardly be the desire of the good people of Canada, nor can we see how it can be tolerated by the authorities in Canada. The prize fight and the reproduction in living pictures should stand or fall together. This view is being taken by state Governors and Mayors of cities in the United States. Premier Whitney will exclude the fight pictures from Ontario. What say Premier Hazard and Mayor Rogers?
