McNitt, Secretary of the School Board, was as follows:—Queen Square School, 1 house flag; St. Rochford Square School, 2 houses flagged and one other pupil ill, cause unknown; Prince Street School, 4 cases Scarlet Fever; West Kent School, 1 case Scarlet fever. From the above it would appear there are two cases of Scarlet fever less in the city schools than reported a week ago.
