ANOTHER RETURNED HERO HONOURED

Private Lockerby of Fortune Cove, Wounded at Langemarck, Given a Royal Welcome Home Yesterday.

Another of the Island's returned heroes, Pte. J. Erskine Lockerby, son of Mr and Mrs H. R. Lockerby, Fortune Cove, was given a fitting reception on his arrival in Charlottetown yesterday. Pte. Lockerby arrived by the Stanley special from Georgetown and was met at the station by a detachment of B Company, 105th, under command of Captain McLeod, with Lieutenants Cosh and Sutherland. There was a large gathering of citizens at the station awaiting his arrival and although there was no speech making the welcome home was a warm and cordial one, his home district being represented by Mayor Agnew of Alberton.

Pte. Lockerby, when the war broke out was on the staff of the Canadian Bank of Commerce in Vancouver and was one of the first Canadians to offer his services. Two days after war was declared he enlisted with the Seaforth Highlanders and proceeded almost at once to Valcartier, where they were formed into the 16th Battalion Canadian Scottish. They trained at Valcartier till September 28th, when they crossed to England. On February 10th they left Salisbury Plains for France and within two weeks were sent to the trenches. His baptism of fire was received at Neuve Chapelle, from which he escaped unhurt. Fol-

PROHIBITION DISCUSSED

OTTAWA, April 3.—Amendments to the Government Bill now before the House providing for enforcement of provincial prohibition legislation were moved by Mr. H. H. Stevens, who covered, while the bill is being considered in committee by the House late tonight. One of these amend- ments adds the cancellation of inland revenue licenses to brewers and dis- tillers in addition to the regular pen- alties already provided in the bill for such persons when they ship liquor into any province in contravention of its prohibitory laws. The other provides for the labelling as such of all packages of intoxicating liquor shipped into prohibition territories. During the discussion of the bill itself the Minister of Justice cleared up a misunder-

FROM THE TRENCHES

The following letters have been re- ceived by Mr. and Mrs. Milton Mc- Donald, Roseberry, from their brother Angus who is fighting in France.

France, March 1st, 1916.

Dear Sister:—I received your welcome letter today and just a few lines in reply. It has been pretty cold the last few days had a little snow just enough to cover the ground but the farmers here have their crops all in.

I received the candies and papers you sent me and thank you very much as I like to get a few papers. The socks you sent were just great.

You wanted to know something about the war here but really you know more than I do myself. We hold only a small part of the line and although we are in talking distance of the enemy, we don't see very much of them as they keep out of sight and we do the same. If you get yourself over the parapet it is all over with you as this is a trench warfare. We are out now in a sort of a rest camp and are staying at a farm and sleep- ing in the barn, but we will not be here very long. I had a letter from Cyprus today he is well and getting on

fine. I must close now with best wishes to all and a great deal of love. Your loving brother,

Jan. 26th, 1916.

My Dear Brother and Sister:—I received your very welcome letter a few days ago and also received the boxes which I must thank you for very much as they are splendid and keep my feet good and warm a thing greatly appreciated in the trenches.

I am sitting in my little dugout in the trench now and the shells are whirling over our heads and bursting into the air as well as the enemy's lines. We keep them busy but we can hear them talking and working every night building up their trenches.

There are little towns all around here in which we get the things we need when we are out of the trenches. We are well supplied with clothes and get all kinds of tobacco and cigarettes and a lot of tobacco from British Columbia.

We are having fine warm weather now and things are drying up in good shape. Its beginning to look like summer and the trees are budding out.

I must close now and do a little work.

A SPIRITED DEBATE IN HOUSE YESTERDAY

The PREMIER: Is the hon. member speaking about conditions in his own district?
Mr LEA: Yes, and other districts as well.
The PREMIER: Is it worse than in the early days of prohibition?
Mr LEA: Not worse than it was then, but worse than it was a few years ago.

The PREMIER: Are there any places selling liquor in Crapaud, for instance? If it is known there are any places selling liquor it is the duty of every person who knows of it to report them.
Mr LEA: These places are well known to temperance people, but they are afraid to give the information lest it should leak out.
The PREMIER: Unless information be given concerning these places how can the authorities be expected to deal with them? This was the first he had heard of these ongoing in the Bedouque district.
Mr LEA said the prosecutor should look after the matter, but unless they had a prosecutor in sympathy with the Prohibition law they could not expect the Government for not paying the Alliance's expenses in connection with the Detective Raids, and said Mr Mc- Kinnon had approved the action the Alliance had then taken. He was one of those who believed temperance should be taken out of politics. But at last election the Temperance Alli- ance were charged with introducing politics merely for the purpose of turning sympathy against them. In conclusion Mr Lea said the prosecutor should be appointed by the Temperance Alliance, and the Temperance Alliance should be entrusted with the duty of seeing the law was properly enforced.
