A new club has been formed in London for Canadian nurses on leave there. The need or such a club was brought before the Imperial Order of Daughters of the Empire, and forthwith the funds were provided. The story of the establishing of the club for Canadian nurses at Lady Minto's house, 95 Lancaster Gate, was told recently, when Princess Patricia of Connaught made the formal opening. Lady Perley represented the I. O. D. E. and a guard of honor of Canadian nurses was in attendance.

Lady Perley said that Matron-in-Chief Macdonald had spoken to her of the great need there was for such a club for Canadian nurses. Often nurses on leave had found it impossible to find accommodation in London. Lady Perley cabled to Mrs. Gooderman, president of the I. O. D. E. and she at once made arrangements. Lady Minto has taken a great interest in the Canadians, and it is most appropriate that the club should occupy the house of the wife of a former Governor-General of Canada.

Princess Patricia expressed the great pleasure she felt in being asked to open the club. The rest which the nurses would obtain and the opportunities for recreation which would be given in these charming surroundings she hoped would be of the greatest benefit to the nurses, and fit them for their arduous duties.

The great anxiety of the early days of this week when the war news told of German gains is now lessened by the reassuring news that "the British are confident" and that fresh troops are now reinforcing the allied lines.

It is understood that four of Charlottetown's most popular V. A. D.'s are likely to go overseas in the very near future.
