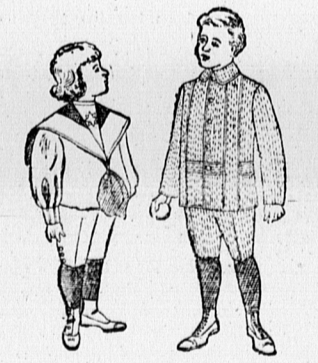

SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION

ALBERTON, Oct. 25.—The Sunday School Convention of the Alberton District was held in the Alberton Methodist Church recently. The first session met at two thirty and was opened by devotional exercises led by Mr. Gordon of Montrose. The chair was taken by the president, Rev. A. E. Westmoreland, and the minutes of the previous meeting were read and adopted. Reports from eight schools of the district were then received. Favorable comment was made on Cambridge Presbyterian School because it had an average attendance of twenty-five out of thirty enrolled. The total amount contributed to the Association was thirty dollars. The President having visited all the schools but two, followed his report with a brief address on the effectiveness of Sunday School work. After the singing of a hymn the Field Secretary, Rev. J. B. Flynn, gave an interesting address on the character of the Association. The speaker showed how the whole scope of the work of the Sunday School was planned out and provided for by the Association. This address was followed by a discussion on questions relative to Sunday School work. The nominating committee was then chosen as follows:—B. Rogers, Mr. McNeill and Mrs. Miller. After singing a hymn, "When I survey the wondrous cross," the session was closed with the benediction by the Field Secretary. The evening session was opened with devotional exercises by the retiring President. Minutes of the afternoon session were read and adopted. The nominating committee gave their report, which is as follows:—For president, Rev. G. Miller and for secretary-treasurer, Mrs. E. A. Westmoreland. The superintendents of all Sunday Schools were nominated to act with the president and secretary as an executive for the coming year. These nominations were confirmed by the session. After congregational singing, a helpful address was given by B. Rogers on Temperance in relation to Sunday School work. The speaker showed that the Bible was against drunkenness, and urged that the teachers should have this plan to the scholars. After singing another hymn the Field Secretary gave an address on the recent great Sunday School Convention at Louisville. The chief impression of the address was that the Convention had had a great inspiration to the speaker, and he tried to pass on the inspiration he had received. The conference closed by singing "Onward Christian Soldiers" and the benediction by Rev. C. B. Gancu.

ALL WATER ROUTE STILL POPULAR

"Harvard" and "Yale" Travelers' Ideal.

BOSTON, Oct. 24.—The summer season is now over and many persons are asking how long the "Yale" and "Harvard" will continue on the all-the-way-by-water route between Boston and New York. "That depends," said Calvin Austin, "on the public, and the amount of patronage we receive." In other words, let it be understood that if the public see fit to travel by this route and will make it an object, the boats will be continued indefinitely. There is no reason why they should not pay, particularly when the ships are sailing so close to schedule time, and making perfect speed. They have each made record time all the season long, doing in round figures three hundred and seven nautical miles in fifteen hours or less, from port to port. When it is considered that at times this schedule has even been reduced an hour, and that the comfort and safety of the travellers is the first consideration of the Company, it will be seen that every advantage is provided.

There are in each ship 250 finely appointed staterooms, 40 en suite with bath, and there are also 500 very comfortable berths in both women's and men's cabins.
