EARTHQUAKE REPORTED FROM VALPARISO

The City Apparently The Scene Of Disaster—Unconfirmed Reports Of Its Total Destruction—Buildings First Destroyed by the Shock Then Consumed By Fire—Same Report From Buenos Ayres And Other Points

NEW YORK, August 17.—(Special)—Since noon today communication with Chili has been cut off, and no confirmation is obtainable of early reports of an earthquake causing immense damage and great loss of life in Valparaiso. Buenos Ayres cables that the town of Los Andes in the province of Aconcagua is totally destroyed.

INDIAN CHIEFS VISIT LONDON

LONDON, Eng., Aug. 16.—Lord Strathcona, in saying good-bye to the visiting Indian chiefs today, presented each with a small silver box containing a sovereign. On the lid of each box was a portrait of the late Queen Victoria.

The three Indians referred to in the London despatch are Chief Joe Capilano, head of the Squamish tribe, Chief Basil, of the Bonaparte tribe, and Chief Charlie Tsilapaymit. All three come from the province of British Columbia. In an interview in a London paper, Chief Joe Capilano, who is the leader of the party, gave through an interpreter an account of the mission of the Indians. He said: "Where, in days not long gone by, the Indians hunted the elk, moose, caribou, deer, Rocky Mountain sheep and goat, panther grizzly and black bears, lynx and wolf; where water fowl, grouse and feathered game dwelt there is now none. Instead, you find there are townships and cities. The game has been ruthlessly slaughtered. The close season should be made more restrictive for the whites and more open for us. With them this is a creation; with us it is our living."

"Our representations to the big chiefs of the white race at Ottawa have not seemed to have any effect. Hence our visit to see the King King. Yesterday we saw Lord High Commissioner Strathcona, a mighty chief and hunter himself. We are sure of his sympathy and hope he will arrange for us to see the king. We would like to leave in about a week, but if we have to wait a month or six weeks we shall do so to attain our object."
