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RECALL SPIRIT OF OLD ARMIES ARMISTICE DAY

Tomorrow Will Bring Tributes To Memory Of Nations War Dead.

(By The Canadian Press) Although the Great War is receding into history and a generation to whom that conflict is only a memory of youth is assuming an increasing share in national activities, Canada will again observe Armistice Day on Nov. 11 as one of remembrance and consecration.

Battle casualties in the Canadian forces numbered 190,092 from the declaration of war Aug. 4, 1914, to Armistice Day, Nov. 11, 1918. Of these 69,661 were killed in action, or died of wounds or sickness. The total represents nearly one-third of all who enlisted in the Canadian forces, in addition to Canadians who served in those of the United Kingdom and the allies.

A total of 647,685 Canadians served. This included Canadian Expeditionary Forces, 619,636; Royal Canadian Navy, 8,226; Royal Flying Corps (including cadets and mechanics) 18,822; Royal Military College graduates in other forces than Canadian, 371. In addition many Canadians served in other armies of the allies and of these there is no official trace.

Men from Canada's military forces, as distinct from those who saw service at sea, fought on eight major fronts. Their concentration was in France and Belgium; but many fought also in the Balkan Peninsula, in Palestine, North-West Persia and the Caucasus; Siberia; North Russia; Mesopotamia and Italy. Records are available to some 100,000 who fought as Russian Turkish, Afghan, East African and the Kamerons.

Of those who became casualties as a result of war service, 79,882 are in receipt of pensions while 12,169 receive the war veterans allowance.

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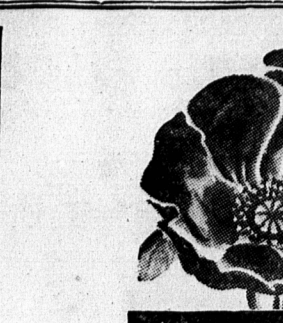

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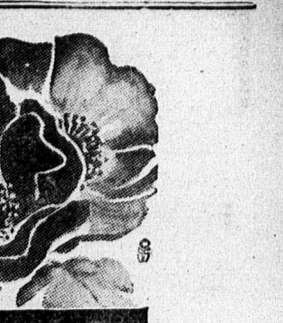
