BURMESE WIZARDS
UNCANNY POWERS OF

In lower Burma there is a town which is surely the most weird and uncanny place on the map.

Few Europeans have ever penetrated to it, but Indians who have been there declare it is inhabited by wizards and necromancers who wield strange powers.

Visitors who enter this town of Kala Tungstong are said to be doomed. A native who went there found a terrible silence brooding over the place. His bearers would not go near the place, declaring that the maddening which almost circle it are also of beings neither human nor supernatural but possessing the characteristics of both man and demon.

The woods are entirely devoid of bird life, but extraordinary and grotesque noises are heard coming from the deeper parts of the forest. The night is made hideous with the sound of gongs and the wild chaunt of wizards invoking the spirits of the dead to reappear.

Strange are the stories of incidents told about this town. A trader saw a foot taken out of a bag, its head cut off and then put on again, after which the head, when placed on the ground walked away. Another traveller in Burma has written that he saw a necromancer expand himself by some means in to the size of a small balloon, cut pipes and disappear to the sound of an explosion.

There are wizards who believe they can transform themselves in to the shape of wild animals, and they strike terror into the hearts of the superstitious natives.

Women who have been rubbed with oil enchanted by a wizard are said to lose their reason and to flee away into the woods, says a writer in "The Occult Review."

They retain their human shape for seven days, and if within that period a man shall submit himself to the same process of being inflated with the magic oil, and shall follow the woman to the woods and strike her on the head with a heavy bar, she shall recover her reason and return home cured.

If, however, this is not done at the end of the seven days she is transformed into a tigress.

HIS OWN COMPLAINT GAVE HIM A YEAR IN JAIL

MONTREAL, Jan. 25.—Dr. Malcolm Amos Lafrance, of 796 St. Catherine street East, this city, was sentenced here today to serve one year in jail for having sold cocaine illegally. It was proved at the physician's trial some weeks ago that he had sold between 11 and 12 ounces of the drug to a man who had paid \$2,000 for it. The United States had a \$100,000 appraised value. Canadian funds of \$750, Dr. Lafrance laid a complaint that he had been defrauded and his complaint led to his own arrest on a charge of selling drugs. The jail sentence will not take immediate effect as the defence have served notice of intention to appeal to the Court of King's Bench at their March term.

Canada's High Commissioner Reflects Nation's Greatness

LONDON, Jan. 25.—The important message attached in Britain to the selection of best type of Canadian as High Commissioner in London was emphasized by the wish expressed by the Duke of Devonshire at the Canada Club dinner to Sir George Perley on Tuesday evening, that the experiment of appointing to the post a man of Cabinet experience be continued.

It is further pointed out by the Times in an editorial today. Under the caption, "Dominion Ambassadors," the Times says in part: "While Canadians in London are united to bid farewell to Sir George Perley, the Australians are united to welcome Sir Joseph Cook. The honor extended to them is more than a compliment to their personality. It is a compliment to the office which they hold. More and more are the peoples of this country and the Dominions recognizing the growing importance of adequate representation of the Empire's interests at the Empire's centre."

If the war proved that the Dominions were possessed of a unity of purpose and a loyalty to the common cause that would have surprised the most ardent imperialist twenty years ago, peace has brought a claim on their part for equal status and the recognition of that claim both by Great Britain and by other powers. At Paris, at Versailles, at Geneva and at Washington, the Dominions established their right to a separate voice and to a separate vote.

In this gradual transition from a collection of dependent Dominions to a union of powerful nations, occasional misunderstandings are apt to arise, and it is in the prevention of such misunderstandings and in the maintenance of peace time of those ties which tighten automatically in times of war, that a Dominion High Commissioner can do invaluable work.

Germany Faces Daily Deficit

BERLIN, Jan. 25.—The Reichstag opened today confronted with the enormous daily deficit of 449,000,000 paper marks, but the members showed no unity in that purpose to strike about 1,000,000 names on the state tax-roll and to stop the presses that are printing billions of "money."

Having already on the books hundreds of laws imposing taxes which are two years behind in collection, the Reichstag devoted its opening session to discussing further tax laws. Even the fate of the Weimar Government hangs on the question of taxation.

Chancellor Wirth's Centre party is inclined to support the demand of Herr Stinnes, that the deficit be solved by cutting the state payrolls while the other chief parties of the Weimar Coalition, the Social Democrats want confiscatory taxes, which would prove practically confiscatory.

Three-Fold Task.

His is a three-fold task. As an immigration agent, his duty is to arrange for the passage of British people overseas, thereby safeguarding both the development of his Dominion as a part of the Empire and the strengthening of the Empire as a whole. As ambassador he must be prepared to act from time to time as the representative of his Dominion at the Council table of the nations. As a liaison officer between Great Britain and Greater Britain he will be called upon to interpret mutual demands and adjust mutual differences. It is evident therefore that a Dominion High Commissioner must be a man who has won the trust of his countrymen and proved himself capable of administering the affairs of his country. Australia has recognized this fact, and since the establishment of the post, twelve years ago, each of her three High Commissioners has been a former Prime Minister of the Commonwealth.

New Building Needed.

No doubt the Canadian Government, when appointing Sir George Perley's successor, will ensure that the new High Commissioner will be not only worthy to succeed his predecessors but will be capable of carrying the increasing burdens of an office, the political and social importance of which is growing every day. At the same time they would do well to give heed to Sir George Perley's reminder at the Canada Club dinner as to the need for the erection of a suitable build-

PLACED IN CRYPT

PARIS, January 25.—The body of Mrs. Thomas S. Ryan, who died in the American Hospital at Newbury on Thursday from poisoning, will be sent to the United States on the first available steamer. It has been placed in the crypt of the American church pending funeral services, which will be held either Monday or Tuesday. Mrs. Ryan's mother will accompany the body to the United States.

Mrs. Ryan, a California woman, known professionally as Miss Andrew Crockett, suffered from several days before her death from the effects of poison tablets she swallowed while in the hotel room of her husband, a member of the Paris staff of the Chicago Tribune. Her husband was taken into custody by the Paris police in connection with the poisoning.

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Recover's Wallet In Dramatic Way

SOUTHAMPTON, Jan. 25.—Hunt, former United States Minister to Siam, who sailed for New York aboard the America today, recovered in dramatic fashion, before the boat left, some valuable papers and a cheque for \$184 stolen from him in London a few days ago. They reached him in registered letter forwarded to him from the American Consul in London hotel after a tour of Europe and Asia. There his wallet was stolen. Suspecting who the thief was, he wrote the suspect a cheque and saying that if he pressed to go straight in the future could keep the money the wallet contained. The thief responded by returning the contents of wallet minus the cash. The American carried the largest cargo of mail goods sent to America since the war. It occupied 214,564 cubic feet in the hold and included 1,600 bags of potatoes, a quantity of salt, feathers, goods and musical instruments.
