HORSE NOTES

James Boutiller who formerly campaigned the Quebec and Ontario will this year handle the horses owned by W. G. Fenwick of Bathurst, N. B., including A. Hal 2,034.

Frank Boutiller is bringing home with him Ora Pino (4) 2,034, who performed so brilliantly in Tommy Murphy's stable last year. It is rumored that that Free For All is owned by a syndicate of Halifax Horse men.

The local track is in great shape under the efficient work of caretaker Arbing. About twenty horses are being worked over it and some good miles are reported.

Our popular horseman Hammond Kelly has leased the Riverside Trotting Park and will put on Matinee Races the 18th day of June. The probable classes are 2.25 class mixed and a 3 minute pace as the prizes will be other than money (probably oats) the horse winning will not receive a record. Get your green ones ready for Riverside boys!

Charlottetown will open the ball with Matinee Races on June 25th about \$5,500 in oats will be competed for and there will be no entrance and no deductions from money winners. The classes are 2.20 trot and pace, 2.25 trot and pace 2.35 trot and pace. Trotters allowed three seconds. The writer predicts that these races will be among the most exciting ever held here.

Mr. Phil Belliveau of Moncton paid a visit to this city a short time ago to secure entries for his races on July 1st and 2nd. His proposed classes are as follows: Free For All, 2.17 trot, 2.20 pace, 2.25 class mixed, 2.17 class mixed.

Summerside are putting on a greatly improved meeting for July 1st offering \$650 in purses which is nearly double former years.

Owing to the high cost of racing and training horses all horsemen through out Canada and the United States are a unit in demanding larger purses. The tracks are meeting them generously and are increasing of necessity the price of admission. The old 25c is a thing of the past the world over.

- Fredericton, September 15th to 18th.
- Chatham, September 24th to 26th.

It will be noted that Chatham has crept in on Charlottetown dates but it is thought that our local people will not back down but will continue using the dates that have been ours for years.

Ex-Mayor Bron, the veteran horseman will race Pictou S., the fast trotting son of Aquiri 2,274 this year through the Island circuit. Last year Pictou S. met with an accident that prevented him "doing the subject justice" but is O. K. now and should be a serious contender in his races the coming summer. The things that P. S. and Dean Swift did to the worshippers of frienzied finance on several occasions were enough to make them jump off the dock. If you want the proof ask P. S. about that race back in October 1884 at Fredericton, N. B. against Sandy Morris with A.C. Slipp up and several others, when P. S. played the anvil chorus and defuncted the anvil for the occasion.
