Proacher Discusses Centuries Old Cry Echoed by Isaiah

Following is a summary of an eloquent sermon delivered in St. James Church on Sunday morning, June 16, by Rev. E.C. Evans, Belfast.

"One calleth unto me out of the night? Watchman, what of the night? Watchman, what of the night? Watchman, what of the night? Watchman, what of the night?"

"The language in which our text is couched is strange in form and enigmatical in meaning. In order to understand it it will be necessary to know something of the historical setting. The period was that of the Assyrian oppression which not only harassed and despoiled Judah, but effected the surrounding nations. Sharing in their neighbour's sin they shared in their neighbour's punishment, and, like the primary sufferer were downcast and despondent, asking wearily and anxiously, how long?"

"One by one the nations present themselves before the prophet's vision. The man of God is trying to visualize, to analyze, to control the events. He is conscious of the deep unrest that is abroad; of the yearning of those near and about him. The pall of darkness is over the land, as he meditates over the turn of events the stillness is broken by the wailing cry of the night. What of the night? Is it nearly over? Are there any streaks of dawn? And the answers? The morning cometh, and also the night. If ye will inquire, inquire ye: turn ye, come."

"In interpreting these words Dr. George Adam Smith says, 'Our translation, though picturesque, is misleading. The eastern sky is being quire what of the night, i.e. whether it be fair or foul weather, but how much of the night is passed. Literally, what from of the night? This brings out a pathos that our English version has disguised. Edom feels that her night is terribly long. How long before the morning dawns, and what will the dawn bring."

Is Heard Today

"It is a long cry from the days of Isaiah to the twentieth century but the cry that was heard in the bosom of the prophet as he stood beneath the eastern sky is being heard all over the world to-day. Our text is not without a modern application and a present day application."

"From every corner of the world is heard a cry, a plea for brotherhood, friendship, understanding, goodwill. For the only thing that will prevent misunderstanding and all the ugly tensions that follow in the train of misunderstanding, is understanding, goodwill, friendship, understanding, goodwill, peoples and appreciation of their problems and difficulties is the only way to prevent misunderstanding which leads to wars and a life-time of hate."

"Out of the unrest of our time one sense of deep sorrow and needs finds articulation in the cry and demand for understanding, brotherhood, friendship, it looks forward to that day when, in the language of the plowman poet, Shall brother to man, the world's end Shall bring the peace that only comes when the world never stood so greatly in need of adventures in the realm of understanding and goodwill as it stands to-day. Only in proportion as we are willing to trust each other, and believe in each other's good faith, can the morning of peace and co-operation dawn. This can only be realized as we are united in a common faith to a common God."

"We think this morning of the Church as the agency of God 'to bring in an era of goodwill.' The church is the watchman standing on the tower to look into and ascertain the real nature of the world's night. Why the unrest? Why the darkness? What hangs over the world? Why in many parts of this and other lands is the burden of the oppressor's goading felt until people are goaded to the point of revolt and mutiny?"

"We take up our morning papers and more frequently than we care to see there are indications of disturbance here and there. Different sections of society at enmity with each other. It is one form of the cry that was heard by the prophet of old, Watchman, what of the night? How long before the dawn of God's good morning, how long before christian brotherhood is experienced between all sections of society, sections that are indispensable to each other, and yet so often misunderstand each other."

In Hour Of Need

"The world turns to the church in the hour of need. In every age and in every land the truth holds. In the hour of danger, when a crisis has to be met, when the sense

of need is heavy upon us and our impotency to meet that need is realized it is to the institution that represents God that men turn for light and guidance, ever in the world puts its question to God's representative, Watchman, what of the night?"

"What light has the church to send on the dark and perplexing problems that call for solution? How the church answer to the age long cry of the human heart for an explanation of life. For what does the church stand? What religion is to the life; what worship is to the soul, so is the church to the world, the life giving centre, the source of inspiration, the source of hope. It stands the servant of all and exists to cultivate and develop the highest life."

"When the world cries to the church, Watchman, what of the night? How long before the dawn? The church replies, 'If ye will inquire, inquire ye, turn ye, come. The church exists to diffuse light—the light of the gospel, the light of God. The church exists to radiate warmth, the warmth of the Good of consequences is broken by the church stands to direct the steps of man along the path of life as it has stood for nearly two thousand years. The church is pointing to Him who is the way the truth and the life 'so it stands today still pointing to Him who is the way to goodwill, friendship and love."

"In the unrest of our day we hear the cry of the human heart for God, the great satisfier 'Lord show us the father, that is all we want' in the last analysis the hunger for the good of the world is a religious hunger. Good will cannot come, peace cannot come, until men are actuated by the same motives, until their desires are blended in the spirit of universal love."

"Watchman, what from of the night? How long before the dawn? And the Church replies: When the night is over and gone, the power of sin with its hideous Good of consequences is broken by the Church of Righteousness rises with healing in His wings the dawn will break fair and calm upon the world."

Mr. William E.
