TWENTY KILLED MORE INJURED

By a Head-on Railway Collision, the Result of Operator's Failure to Deliver Train Orders—Many Bodies of Negroes Among Those Recovered

CHARLOTTE, N. C., July 23.—(Special)—About twenty persons were killed and more than that number wounded as the result of a head-on collision between the through east-bound passenger train and an extra freight near Rockingham, N. C. four miles west of Hamlet at 8.30 o'clock last night.

CONCLUSION OF FEEHAN INQUEST

No New Information Brought to Light—Several Witnesses Examined—Feehan was Able to Take Care of Himself—Boat Not Able to Work Against the Tide.

The inquest into the death of the late John Feehan, of Rocky Point, was concluded in the City Court Room last night before Coroner McNeill and jury. The witnesses examined were: Mrs. Edward Egan (sworn)—John Feehan came to my house at 6 o'clock the evening he disappeared. He asked me what he owed me, and paid me fifty cents. He pulled out a bulky roll of bills and showed it to Alex Buchanan. He was not drunk. As far as I know he was able to take care of himself. I cannot say how much money he had—perhaps not more than \$5.
