Members of the Canadian Legion, attending the memorial services yesterday, marched to the cenotaph in Queen Square and deposited a wreath on the monument as a mark of respect for the late King. At three o'clock from Victoria Park a battery in command of Major P. S. Fielding and Lieutenants Harold Messervy and F. C. Brady boomed a 70-gun farewell salute to King George.

Throughout the province, purple and black-draped government buildings, business establishments, stores and theatres had been cancelled and public activities suspended. Winter made its presence felt in Prince Edward Island yesterday. A heavy blow was struck to all forms of travel as a heavy snowstorm, driven by a howling gale, swept out of the north-east across the province. In all parts of the Island traffic was greatly disrupted, on the highways it was almost completely at a standstill.

Tides were the highest for 33 years, the water along the waterfront in Charlottetown flowing in some cases almost three feet over the top of the wharves and flooding into warehouses. Horses had to be removed from several streets when the water was at its highest, about 1.30 in the afternoon. At Mount Stewart the East River, rising to far above normal levels, covered the railway tracks with two feet of water holding up the incoming train from several hours. The water also came up to the tracks in the C.N.R. yard in Charlottetown.

At Tormentine the S.S. Charlotteville was delayed until 8:30 last evening before the cars taken over to keep morning crossing could be unloaded. The unusually high tide was the cause of the delay. In Charlottetown and Summerside snow plows had cleared the streets which had seriously interfered with motor traffic. The trains were running very little behind schedule. A slow train went out in front of the Borden express yesterday morning, clearing the line and the Souris and Murray Harbor trains were reported only half an hour behind time. 100 men had obtained work in Charlottetown clearing the railroad of snow, which was loaded on flat cars and taken out to the terminal. Roads to the Airport were still blocked and the plane from Moncton landed on the ice at Inkerman Cove and the mail was brought to the city by teams. A spare plane made the crossing from Moncton early yesterday morning bringing over the mail intended for Tuesday's flight, which had to be cancelled on account of the storm.
