Frogs Sold by War Assets Corp.

WILLIAM HENRY TOWNSEND

The death took place at his home in Rollo Bay West, P.E.I., on Sunday, Dec. 16, 1945, of William Henry Townsend, of the age of seventy-nine years. He was a son of the late Charles Worthall Townsend of Rollo Bay and was a member of one of the old families of the community. He possessed large farming interests and was widely known as a progressive and prosperous farmer whose stock frequently won prizes at County and Provincial Exhibitions.

In addition, for many years, Mr. Townsend was interested in construction work in various parts of the province, where his ability was widely recognized, and for some time he was bridge and building foreman of the Prince Edward Island Division of the Canadian National Railways. For a number of years he lived during the winter months in Charlottetown, where he possessed a residence, but he generally returned to his home in Rollo Bay each spring and summer.

About four years ago, he suffered an illness which undermined his previous vigorous health, though he made a good recovery at the time. During this last summer his infirmities grew upon him and it was only for the past few weeks that he was unable to be up and about. He passed quietly and peacefully early on Dec. 16th.

The funeral was held on Tuesday, Dec. 18th, from the residence in Rollo Bay and was largely attended by a wide circle of friends and relatives from near and far. It was conducted by Rev. W. A. MacQuarrie of Souris, assisted by Rev. D. W. MacPherson of St. Peter's Bay and the choir of Bay Fortune United Church. The hymns, "Lead Kindly Light" and "Abide With Me" were sung and Mr. MacQuarrie paid a fitting tribute to the deceased and spoke of his many virtues. There were many beautiful floral tributes.

The interment was at a place in the Bay Fortune cemetery and was conducted by Rev. W. A. MacQuarrie.

Mr. Townsend was married to Margaret Francis, daughter of the late John Francis of Fortune Bridge, who survives him, and who has four daughters, viz: Hazel, Mrs. E. L. McEwen, Greenwick, P. E. I.; Bell, Mrs. Roy MacQuarrie, P. E. I.; Florence, Mrs. P. A. White, Needham, Mass.; and Esie, Mrs. Walter Bowness, and seven sons, Charles, of Fortune Bridge, John, of Charlottetown; Leith, of Souris; Roy, of New Acadia, P. E. I.; Edwin, of Souris; Clifford, at home; and Lloyd, of Fortune Bridge. One daughter, G. I. Hamilton, the Spence of Charlottetown, predeceased him.

He is also survived by two sisters, Geo. A. Thompson, and Miss Martha Townsend of Montague. To all these, the Guild of Women in extending sincere sympathy.
