Enclose porches with screening or glass.  
Grade around foundation.  
Improve garden.  
Enclose open spaces under porches and house with latticework.  
Install lightning arrestors.  
Lay concrete floor in garage.  
Lay new porch floor.  
Lay new roofing materials.  
Lay new sidewalks.  
Paint surfaces where necessary.  
Painting paves.  
Plant flowers, shrubbery and trees.

Provide boot scrapers.  
Provide chimney pots or tile.  
Provide garden furniture.  
Provide porch awnings, blinds, etc.  
Provide splash blocks below downspouts.  
Remove obsolete ornamental trimmings from house and porches.  
Repair chimneys.  
Repair or replace and paint or stain fences.  
Repair garage doors, etc.  
Replace old porch steps.  
Replace porch columns and railings with more modern types.  
Replace porches with formal entrances.  
Replace wall surfaces with newer or more attractive materials.  
Replace worn-out gutters and downspouts with durable material.

### HEATING

Apply fireproofing around heating equipment.  
Build fireplace.  
Increase amount of radiation.  
Install concealed radiators.  
Install radiant heaters, logs, etc.  
Install ready-built fireplace equipment units.  
Install special mantels.  
Insulate heating equipment and pipes in basement.  
Install throat and damper devices in open fireplaces.  
Paint radiators.  
Provide fireplace ash dump and accessories.  
Provide fireplace hardware.  
Provide heat in garage.  
Provide humidifiers, air conditioners, etc.  
Provide radiator covers or cabinets.  
Provide register shields.  
Provide thermostat controls.  
Replace obsolete heating equipment with modern types.

### INTERIOR OF HOUSE

#### (GENERAL)

Build clothes chute.  
Build clothes closet.  
Build dining alcove or breakfast nook.  
Build linen closet.  
Install baseboards, picture molding, etc.  
Install partitions to provide additional rooms or closets.  
Install telephone cabinet.  
Lay new floor over old.  
Paint and wallpaper.  
Panel walls or ceiling.  
Provide built-in book-cases or cabinets.  
Provide built-in cabinet for fire extinguisher.  
Provide built-in mail box.  
Provide rubber or composition stair tread coverings.  
Provide wall or ceiling insulation.  
Purchase new furnishings.  
Remove partitions to afford additional space.  
Remove walls to provide open stairway.  
Replace old stair posts and railings with modern types.  
Replace worn-out treads on stairs.

#### KITCHEN

Build kitchen cabinets and shelves.  
Install a refrigerator.  
Install safety rear door.  
Install sanitary garbage disposal equipment.  
Install wall tile.  
Lay floor coverings such as linoleum, rubber tile, etc.  
Provide built-in broom closet.  
Provide built-in ironing board.  
Provide milk and package receiver.  
Provide ventilating fans and equipment.

#### LIGHTING AND POWER

Improve radio aerial and connections.  
Install additional bells for convenience.  
Install lights on porches, in basement, and garage.  
Install modern lighting system in place of obsolete type.  
Install transformer in place of battery bell system.  
Install wall brackets.  
Insulate exposed wire where required.  
Provide additional convenience outlets.  
Provide new appliance cords.  
Replace old fixtures with modern types.  
Rewire with modern system to reduce fire hazard.

#### PLUMBING

Cover water pipes to prevent freezing.  
Install additional shut-off cocks or valves.  
Install efficient water system in place of open well, hand pump, etc.  
Install extra shower in basement.  
Install refrigerator drain.  
Install water softener system.  
Provide laundry tubs.  
Provide water-heating equipment.  
Replace obsolete fixtures with newer types.  
Replace obsolete piping with modern durable type.

#### MISCELLANEOUS

Arrange a play space with sand box, swing, etc., in the yard for the children.  
Build new fence.  
Buy a radio, electrical and gas

appliances, draperies, window shades, furniture, kitchen utensils, garden hose, etc.  
Clean up, make over and beautify lawns.  
Glaze and clean windows.  
Give attention to needed brick-work, cement work, plastering, pointing, cement sidewalks, etc., etc.  
Replace old rugs.

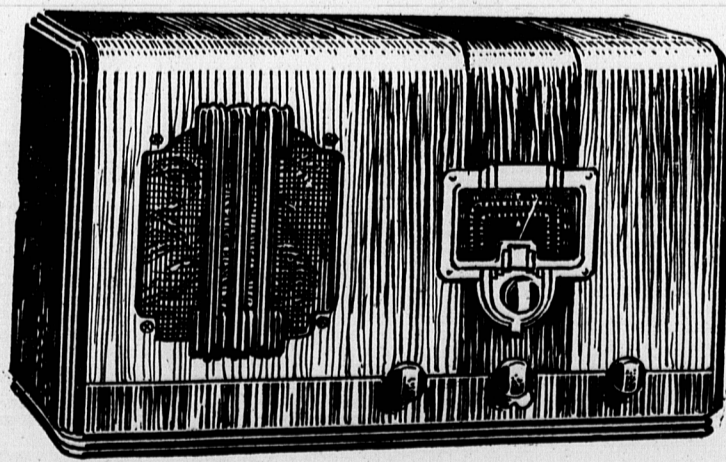
#### AIR TROUBLES PRIVATELY
