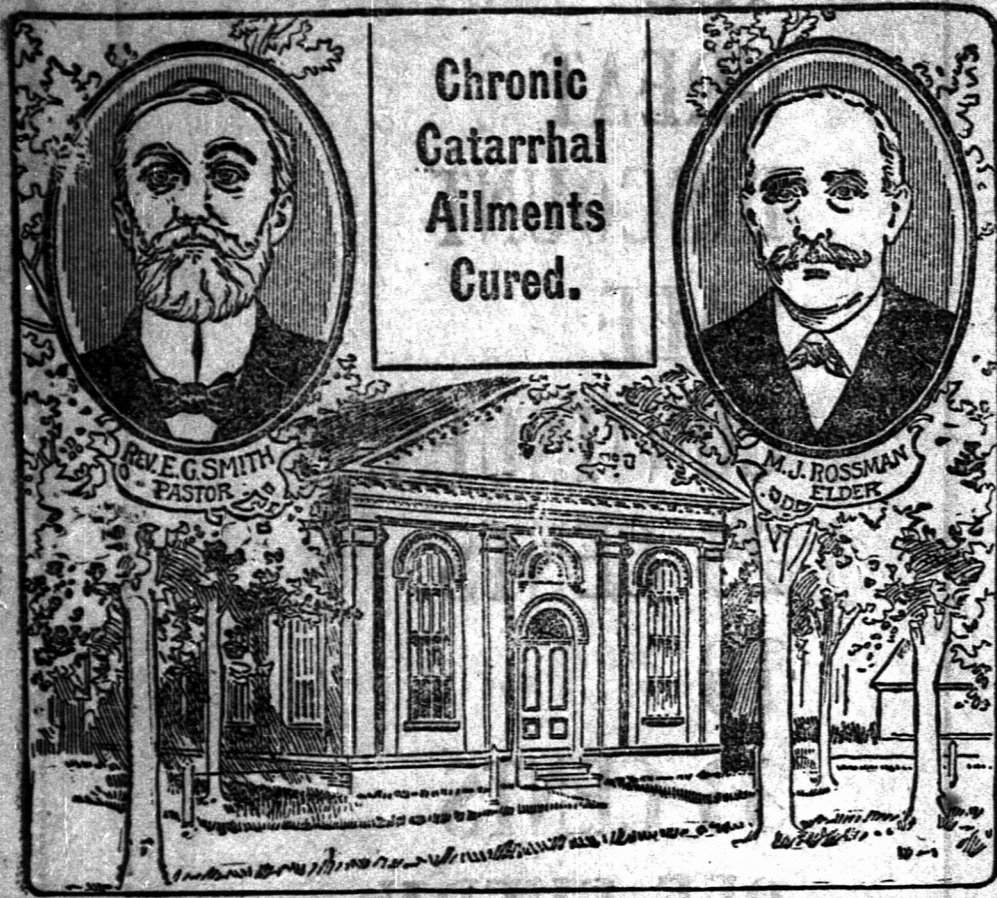

bought liquor in order to help in enforcing the law. I saw a number of people in town violating the law and thought I should give a helping hand. I told Mr. Goff I would help and he told me to go and see Mr. Jenkins at his office. We did not discuss the financial aspect. I paid \$1.90 in all for liquor. My fare to and from Moncton came all out of my own pocket. I went to see Mr. Goff to find out where the office of Mr. Jenkins was. No one told me what I was to get out of the matter. [Mr. Stewart here had the witness de'al his visits to the other drug stores and saloons in all of which he swore he had never said he wanted liquor for his wife.]

D. O'M. Reddio, (sworn)—I am a member of the firm of Reddio Bros. We conduct a drug business and are expected to keep liquor. I was sick from the first week in December till Christmas eve. I instructed all the clerks to sell only according to law. Afterwards Mr. Jenkins called on me and I then made my orders doubly strong.

To Mr. Jenkins—Did not see Leatham and his wife at the station with Mr. Goff. I did not kick Goff but gave him a shove. The Magistrate stated that the case must be decided on a general principle and in order to consider the matter would adjourn the case till Monday for judgment.

The next case called was that of Angus Macdonald. J. J. Johnston appeared for the defence.

John Leatham (sworn) I was at Macdonald's bar on the 17th. I got a flask of whisky from Macdonald himself. I paid 50 cents for it. I said nothing whatever about a sick wife.

To Mr. Johnston—I said nothing about selling stock—only gave him a prospectus. He at first refused the liquor, then I told him I would take it and I would not be long in town. I did not tell him I wanted it for a sick wife, nor that I was unwell at the time.

The defendant was then fined \$10.00 and costs, the third offence as in the Gillis case being changed to a first offence.

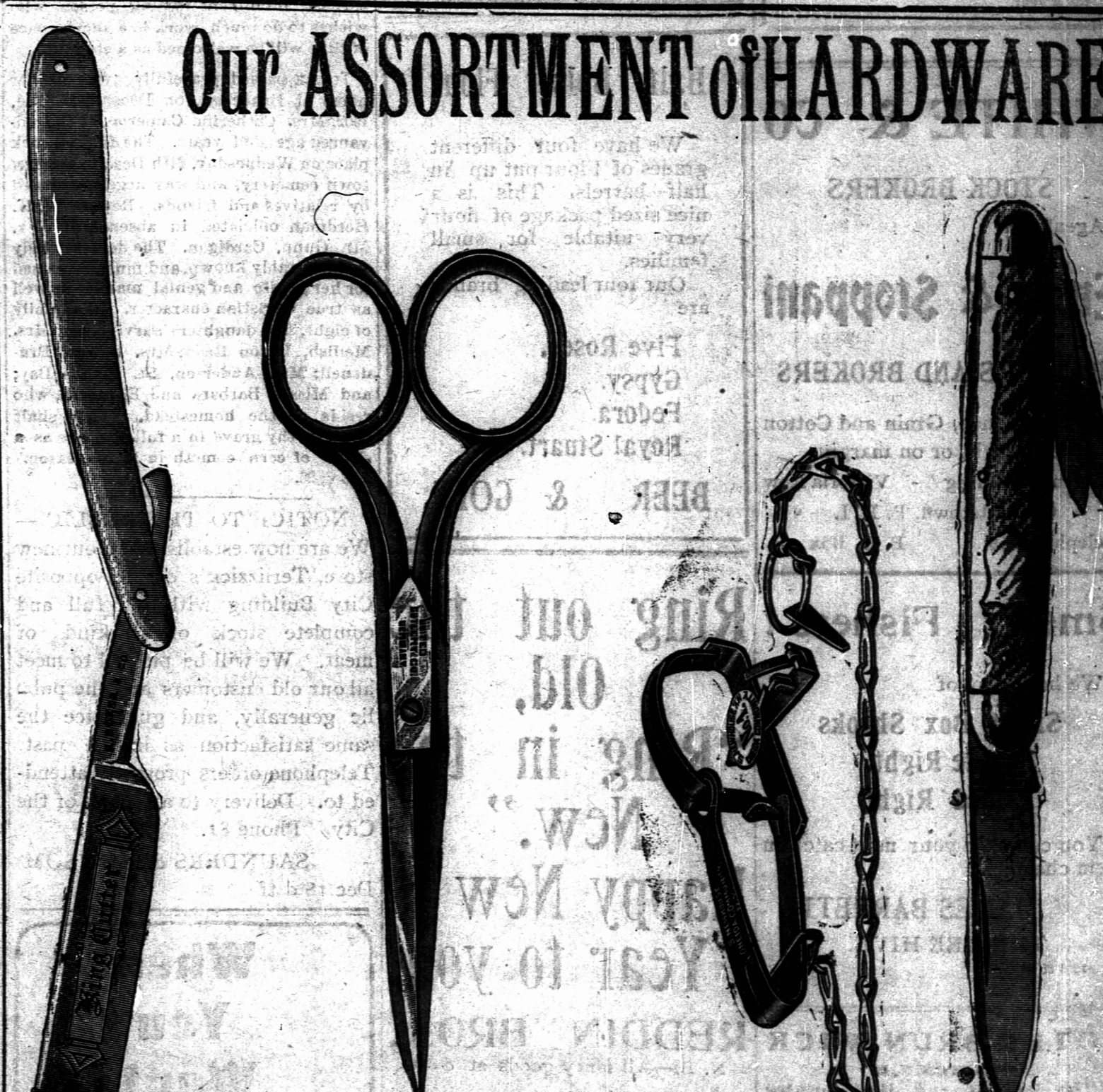
