Potato Growers Association The directors of the P. E. Island Potato Growers Association met Tuesday evening in the office of the local Department of Agriculture. This was the first meeting held since the annual meeting. Officers were elected as follows: President—A. E. Dewar, re-elected. Vice-President for Prince County—W. H. McGregor. For Queens County—J. Walter Jones. For Kings County—D. F. McDonald. Secretary Treasurer—Wilfred Boulter. Matters relative to incorporation were discussed and the procuring of a suitable trademark for the Association. The matter of shipments of the balance of seed stock was discussed and it was decided to advertise in the local press, giving the growers a chance to procure No. 1 disease-free seed before all available were disposed of.

Quarrel at Dance; One Man Wounded MONTREAL, February 22.—Following a quarrel, presumably about a woman, William Wallace, colored, was struck three times when an unknown colored man, terminated a wordy argument by drawing a revolver and discharging its contents point blank. The shooting took place in the vestibule of the Auditorium Hall, Ontario Street, west, at 4.30 o'clock Saturday morning and the excitement aroused by the affair Wallace's assailant escaped, taking refuge in a motor car which drove away from the neighborhood. Wallace was taken to the Royal Victoria Hospital, where it was found that he had been hit in the left shoulder, the left cheek and the right shoulder. None of the wounds proved to be dangerous and it is expected that Wallace will be able to leave in a few days. Wallace and the man had been quarrelling during the evening over a woman. The two men did not know each other by name, but at the close of the dance Wallace went to the cloak room to get his hat and coat. While he was standing there the other man, whose name the victim was unable to give to the police, came and told him to move away. Wallace did not move away, and the man produced a revolver and fired at Wallace. The latter managed to grasp his assailant and tried to hold him, but Wallace was weakened by his wounds, lost his hold and the assailant escaped. Further investigation revealed the fact that the man was known by sight, but no one could give his name or address to the detectives. He is said to be a violin player in one of the theatres in the city. Two witnesses were found by the detectives, and accompanied by these two they searched the city all day Saturday and yesterday without success. One of the witnesses was held by the detectives. Wallace is 32 years of age and resides at 110 Felix Street.

CAPRONI TESTING GREAT WATERPLANE Designed to Carry 100 Passengers in Trans-Atlantic Service. PARIS, Feb. 22.—On Lake Maggiore, in North Italy, the great Italian airplane builder, Giovanni Caproni, is testing the biggest waterplane ever built. Its passenger capacity is one hundred persons and it is intended to put in hand at once the construction of another and still larger machine of the same type with cabin space for three hundred people, with which he will attempt a trans-ocean flight, probably to the United States, and will seek to inaugurate a trans-Atlantic passenger service.

The elder woman once started to her feet and looked into the empty air above the crowd intently. She had seen a spirit vision of her father, she said.
