

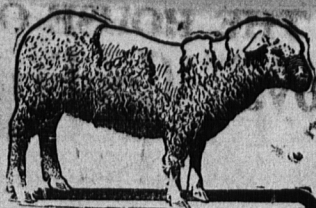

GIRL SPY MAKES DASH FOR LIBERTY

CAPT. HOLMES REINSTATED.—Capt. Holmes, who had his master's certificate taken from him for a time on account of the Morwenna coming into collision with the Dartmouth ferry boat some months ago, has had it returned by the Minister of Marine. The Dominion Coal Co., which owned the Morwenna known widely in shipping circles in Charlottetown, employed the captain in a minor capacity and he was on board the same steamer when it was torpedoed by a German submarine later on off the coast of Scotland. In view of Capt. Holmes' conduct at this time, the Canadian Minister of Marine has deemed it advisable to hasten the time of giving back to the captain his master's certificate.

TO FURTHER INDUSTRY.—The Department of Agriculture is arranging with the Apiarist of the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, to visit some bee-keepers during the summer months. He will spend a few days on the island for that purpose, and any bee keeper who has any trouble in connection with his bees, or would like to have a visit from an expert ought to send his name to the Department of Agriculture, Charlottetown, at an early date. Bee-keeping is important, not only for the production of honey but on account of the value of the bees in disposing pollen. It is an industry too that would have very considerable extension in Prince Edward Island.

ISLANDERS LEAVE HALIFAX FOR FRANCE

The following letter has been received by Mr. and Mrs. Leon J. Arsenault, from their son, Augustin who enlisted some time ago and is now in Europe.

Dear Father and Mother,
As tonight is my last chance I must write you a few lines to tell you that we shall be leaving for England, Friday, May 21st, to give a hand in the big battles that are raging. What we have long been waiting for has come at last. I don't know the reason, but I am anxious to get there, although I should have loved to go to see you all before leaving. It is six long years since I was home, it may be as long again. If I could see you all once more before leaving, it would give me more strength to fight those Germans. Now Dear Mother don't worry, God will bring me home again, I know dear mother when at home I have given you much anxiety and care, but I hope you have forgiven me as I am going to risk my life for you and my country. Do not forget me in your prayers especially next week when we will be on our way across the ocean, and we will not call our selves safe, till we get on the other side, there are so many ships sunk now by the Germans. Of course we will be protected by battleships. I hope to see my brother Theophilus, when he in his turn comes to the front. Now I must bid you good bye, and hope to see you all some day after this cruel war is ended. Tell Eva not to forget me in her prayers. Do not answer before you hear from me again.

WOMAN GUIDED TROOPS

MILAN, June 14.—Gazette del Topolo tells of an interesting incident which occurred at the occupation of a town in the Trentino.

A young woman, seeing the Italian soldiers under fire of the Austrians in the chief streets of the town, left her house and put herself at the head of the troops. She guided them amid a hail of projectiles, explaining the while to the officers the best route to follow to seize the town. For eight hours, until the place was in the hands of the Italians, she remained with the troops, helping them by her knowledge of the place.

She now wears as a decoration a Bersagliere hat, presented by grateful soldiers, but a more substantial reward is spoken of.

REFUSES TO KISS BABY

For the first time in the 15 years he has been a justice of the peace in Flint, Mich., Justice James M. Torrey has sentenced a man to the Detroit House of Correction for failing to support his family. David Braucht, who pleaded guilty to that offence, was sentenced to 65 days.

Justice Torrey, said it was one of the most aggravated cases he ever saw and his patience reached a limit when Braucht refused to kiss his baby while he was in the courtroom.

Mrs. Braucht came to court with their young baby and held the infant out to Braucht, pleading for the father to caress it. The prisoner turned away.

Judge Torrey has made it a practice to put men charged with nonsupport on probation and force them to support their families, but he decided it was no use in this instance.—New York Sun.
