Donations have been sent to the Red Cross, Provincial Sanatorium, T. B. League, Mount Herbert Orphanage, P. E. I. Hospital, Kings County Hospital and the Canadian Legion War Services. \$5 was given in prize for Public Speaking at the school fair. The three year Sewing Club course was provided for the girls. After the new school was built the Women's Institute bought and paid for a stove and drinking fountain for the school room, a stove and two dozen chairs for the Institute room, also two gas lamps, twelve seats and an organ for the hall. Since the Institute was organized four members have been removed by death, ten have moved out of the district and six new ones have moved into the district.

Birthday gifts were exchanged among the members. Lunch was served also a beautiful birthday cake made by Mrs. Preston Peardon and Mrs. Murdoch Buchanan. The meeting then adjourned.

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
